HIGGINS' CASE TO BE REVIEWED

It Will Come Up Before the Supreme Court.

AT FREDERICTON IN NOV.

Judge Landry Thinks That There is Small Chance of the Convicted Youth Escaping.

From present indications it would seem that the sentence of death, imposed upon Frank Higgins, will be carried out December 18th, the day set for the execution. Attorney-General Pugsley when asked about the matter said the case was now beyond the power of the crown as represented by the provincial administration, and that the only thing left for the crown to do was the duty of seeing that the sentence was put into effect.

The case, though will be reviewed before the Supreme Court of New Brunswick on Tuesday, November 4th next, at Fredericton, and it is very probable the matter will be dealt with immediately after after court opens.

Judge Landry in passing through St. John en route from Fredericton to his home in Dorchester, said there was comparatively small chance of the convicted youth escaping execution. His honor's first duty, after passing sentence was to write a report to the secretary of state. In the report is embodied a resume of the case, the evidence and a general statement of the trial proceedings.

This communication is placed before the Minister of Justice, and the government afterwards acts upon it, if an appeal for mercy is made.

It was quite within the rights of a prisoner's counsel to interview members of the government with a view to having the death penalty stayed.

A right which the governor-general has is to confer privately with government members in order to weigh any application for a commutation of sentence with knowledge and justice.
