natural road of expansion and growth is: Firstly, as a place of residence for that fast increasing group of families whose incomes are derived from superannuations, pensions and investments; and, secondly, as the centre and principal provincial seat of an ever-growing summer tourist business.

In the development of Charlottetown as a residential centre I would recognize as a first essential, "Low Cost of Living" and to this end, "Economy"—the elimination of waste, the abolition of the superfluous in all civic services, would have my earliest attention, so that the tax rate might be held at, or reduced to, the lowest possible fraction; and I would seek the most equitable system of assessment for taxation and so exclude cause for dissatisfaction amongst those who pay.

I would endeavor to encourage the formation, by citizens, of a modern city library, to be open on certain evenings or on Sunday afternoons, and thus supply one civic attraction lacking here but available in many other centres of Charlottetown's size.

I would endeavor to have sent out from the Mayor's office a personal letter setting forth the particular and outstanding advantages of Charlottetown as a place of residence, to each employee in Eastern Canada of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways, the chartered banks, the governments and corporations with pension provisions, just at the time, or shortly previous to the time, of such employee's transfer from the active to the superannuated list.

DIVERGENT VIEWS DIFFICULT TO ADEQUATELY RECONCILE

The Unionists and Nationalist Sentiment in Northern Ireland and Waxes Strong in "Pockets."

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rage. To him Ireland as a whole is a nation and the six counties constituting Northern Ireland are merely a small portion of Ireland. He insists that what has been said and done in the past should be again and that the uniting forces of geography, environment, common destiny and history should be resisted by an insistence on religious differences and a distortion of historical happenings.

(Prof. John MacNeill, appointed by the Free State as its boundary commissioner under the treaty, points out, in a study of the situation prepared some time since, that the Ulster Protestants are 20 per cent of the total population of Ireland and that if even the whole of the Protestant population stood opposed to the nationalistic claims of the people which is not the case, the figures would still remain: For Irish self-determination, 73; against self-determination, 25.)

Analysis of the Nationalist and Tyrone to the Free State, the Nationalist believes, would be the forerunner of the union of all Ireland, for he thinks that it would be impossible to make an economic success of a separate Government of the remaining four counties of Northern Ireland. That is why the Unionist is determined not to relinquish Tyrone and Fermanagh, despite their Nationalist majority votes recorded again and again.

Can Make Mistake

In resentment against the partition of Ireland, therefore, the Northern Nationalists, who won twelve seats in the Belfast Parliament, have refused ever to take their seats. The whole attitude of the Nationalists is to hold them away from the Northern Government. As they claim they constitute 34 per cent of the population and to number 450,000 in the six-county area, any one can see that as a discontented minority they are a serious problem for Sir James Craig and his Government. In the Westminster parliamentary elections the Northern Nationalists ran only two candidates, Messrs. Harbison and Hays. If the Nationalists in Fermanagh and Tyrone are not given the plebiscite which they demand under the treaty it is not pleasant to think of the course that events may take. The Republicans in the Free State, although the quest for power to create an end of mischief, and an adverse decision on the treaty issue could easily have the effect of throwing the Republicans and despairing Nationalists of the north into each other's arms. In that event, Sir James Craig's constabulary force, numbering more than 50,000 would have employment on his hands.

Candy Recipe

Traffed apples are prepared thus: To one-half pound of sugar add one teaspoonful of butter and boil until a sandy quantity drops. Put in water will form a ball. Squeeze small apples stick clean, smooth sticks into the stem end, then dip the apples in the candy mixture while it is still hot. Stand in a cool place to harden.

For salt-water taffy, place one cupful of syrup in one quart of a cupful of water and stir until the sugar is dissolved; then add a pinch of cream of tartar, a teaspoonful each of vinegar and butter. Boil until a little of the mixture forms a hard ball, when dropped into cold water. Pour out on a greased plate and cool slightly, then pull until white. Flavor to taste just before removing from the fire. Cut while still soft into pieces an inch and a half in length and wrap the pieces in waxed paper.

For Better Tourist Business

For the development of Charlottetown with respect to the Tourist Business I would recognize that within Charlottetown, and in its wonderful Victoria Park and its superbly beautiful environs and on its magnificent harbor, the great majority of summer tourists can be entertained in a pleasantly more healthily, just as restfully, more economically and more profitably than in any other part of Prince Edward Island.

Recognizing further that large summer hotels operating only during a short portion of the year can be operated most satisfactorily and most successfully by the larger hotels systems having a specially trained, permanent personnel from which to draw their managers and chefs for the busy summer months, I would use my best endeavors at all times, as a Civic Representative, to encourage in every way one of the great railway or steamship hotel systems to establish a modern summer hotel in Charlottetown.

Further I would endeavor to have by-law passed exempting from city taxation for a period of ten or fourteen years all buildings erected for summer tourist accommodation within the city during the next three years exemption to apply only so long as such buildings were used as summer hotels and operated for not less than five or six months in any calendar year.

I would endeavor to find amongst our citizens some practical and enterprising young man thoroughly versed in respect to motor cars, who had faith to believe that the operation of four or five to and from the rural and fishing centers and adjacent would be made to pay; and who was ready to risk some of his own savings and prospective earnings in giving it a trial. Having persuaded the man I would join with him in providing the capital necessary to secure enough busses to make a reasonable start.

Candidates' Pledges

Rotarian Chas. Black answered in the negative the question, "Should citizens ask any candidate to pledge his support to any measures that may be brought up in the City Council," and gave his reasons as follows: "There are a number of people in every ward with different axes to grind. Their support may be very important to a candidate and in a moment of weakness he may pledge himself to something which cannot be carried out in the Council, where the whole interests of the city are to be considered.

It ties the hands of a Councillor or an official to ask him to pledge himself concretely to action which in the last analysis is largely prompted by selfish interests on the part of the different individuals of their localities, at the expense, if it may be, of other sections.

Mr. Black referred to the proposed extension of Bishop Street, and the continuance of the railway along Lower Water Street, as questions upon which a candidate may pledge his support for or against these measures, but he cannot reasonably

Religious Issue Big Factor

With respect to the Free State, their objection is the same which they always voiced from the beginning of the Home Rule agitation, viz "Home Rule is Home Rule." The Ulster Unionists are mainly Scotch planters, who colonized the north of Ireland a century or two ago. This rather tends to shatter the claim to racial differentiation. In contrast with his own Scotch compatriot, if it means to us an indulgent witness. FRANCE AND GERMANY ARE UNABLE TO PROSPER ALONE

Neither Country is Strong Enough to Crush the Other—Only Remedy for Present Troubles is a "Give and Take" Policy by Both Nations.

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Germany is steadily improving her economic position, due to the arbitrary stopping of reparations payments by the Berlin government, and to the stabilization of the currency. The international belief in France's German people are showing confidence in the ability of the Allies in their financial reparations settlement.

The most noteworthy indication of the returning self-satisfaction of the Germans is the persistent refusal to sell bonds on the part of the government. Enniskillen, County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, Jan. 25.—

Ernie O'Connell, M.P., and end of County Fermanagh above the headwaters of the River Shannon, narrows in the midlands and affords a picturesque setting for the town of Enniskillen. When the Ulster Unionists are in the majority they claim the right to rule on that ground, but when they are in the minority numerically they demand their claim to ascendancy on the ground of wealth. Your Ulster Unionist still holds tenaciously to his age-old argument that Ireland is a country of two nations. He would not have a treaty different in racial characteristics, in their practical ideals, in their religious convictions and in their sense of civic and national responsibilities.
