**IN MEMORIAM**

**MR. NEIL CURRIE.**

There passed from this Life to the Great Beyond Mr. Neil Currie Rock Point, April 2nd, at the age of 76 years.

He had been in failing health for the past two years, and had been confined to his bed for the last nine weeks, suffering intensely, but out bore his suffering with great resignation to the Divine Will of Him who doeth all things well. In the passing of Mr. Currie, West River and vicinity has lost one of its stalwart men, possessed of strong physique, more than ordinary intelligence, being able to converse intelligently on any subject, a great reader, a deep thinker, he took a keen interest in the events of the day, especially the great war.

There are left to mourn a widow (two sons and five daughters, named Stephen T. and Mrs. Wm. Match, Rocky Point, Elliot A. and Mrs. Hector McDonald, Province, R. I., Mrs. George Saunders, Boston; Mrs. A. S. McNeill and Mrs. Harold Thorpe, Winnipeg. The funeral took place on the 4th and was very largely attended, the Rev. D. McLean, Charlottetown officiated at both house and grave, paying a high tribute to the spiritual brightness of deceased during his several visits while on his death bed.

Burial took place at New Dominion. The pall bearers were Oskar King, Hugh McPhee, T. A. Stewart, John McLean, Malcolm McNeill and Will Shaw.

**PARIS THE REAL OBJECTIVE OF GERMAN.**

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Statements of German prisoners have it that the real objective of the great German offensive was Paris and not so far from expecting Charles who would make Amiens the goal of blood and undecisive battles, the Tenth high command sent its forces forward prepared for rapid advances in open warfare.

"In order to alleviate the march of the troops," says an official despatch received today from France, "the order was given to prepare for them an organization of convoys in which way as only to carry with them what was indispensable. The remainder was to be stored at a depot designated by the divisions. The loading carriages, the munitions to be carried, the equipment and armaments of the men had been carefully planned as well as the distribution of maps of the country to be invaded, the men carrying reserves of food, enough to last long marches and provisions for three days in every convoy."

"In short, every arrangement shows that the German command had decided to resort to open warfare. It is certain that the military situation, after more than fifteen days of operations, is one of extreme disappointment to the German command."

WHEREAS, it has been made clear that an adequate supply of foodstuff to Great Britain and her Allies is now one of the most critical and essential problems in connection with carrying the war to a triumph;

AND WHEREAS, Our Province of Prince Edward Island by virtue of its agricultural resources and good farming lands, occupies a position of special responsibility and opportunity;

AND WHEREAS, the season approaches which shall determine for another year the amount of foodstuff which this Province shall produce;

WE THEREFORE, believing it to be the aspiration of Our people to discharge every responsibility as in the past, and confident of their willingness to take advantage of the opportunity involved, to the end that the cause of right co-operation for a struggle may be advanced, we have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Executive Council for Our said Province, to appoint, and do hereby appoint, a week of Dedication and Preparation for the period of production approaching, beginning on the twenty second day of April instant.

AND WE DO HEREBY FURTHER request the careful consideration and patriotic cooperation of all Our people in the matters herein set forth to the end that each and everyone may prepare to do all that is possible to increase the production of foods; and particularly to assist in the formation of Greater Production Committees and in the work ensuing therefrom.

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ALL OF WHICH PREMISES all Our loving subjects and all others whom it doth or may in any wise concern are hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

WITNESS: Our trusty and well-beloved His Honour Augustine Colin Macdonald, Lieutenant Governor of Our said Province, in Council, at Charlottetown, in said Province, this tenth day of April in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and eighteen and in the Eighth year of Our reign.

**POLITICAL BOMBSHELL IN BRITISH HOUSE**

Home Rule and Conscription Offered to Ireland by Premier Lloyd George.

LONDON, April 11.—A political bombshell was thrown into the House of Commons yesterday by David Lloyd-George the Prime Minister when he announced that conscription would be extended to Ireland, and that the government intended extending Home Rule to Ireland. The scenes in the House during the course of the Premier's speech in reference to Ireland were dramatic, approving cheers and cries of protest from all parts of the House.

**QUESTIONS FOR PREPARATION WEEK**

EQUIPMENT

1. Examine, repair, paint, and oil machinery.
2. Have extra swinglopes, double trees, and three and four horse eyes.
3. Now is the time to order spraying and harvesting machinery.
4. A lost half day may affect harvest.

HORSES

1. Increase the feed as work increases.
2. Be good to the colt, bathe his shoulders with warm brine before work starts. Use cold water on his shoulders every time he comes in from work.

CROP PLANS

1. Sow cereals in the following order as soon as possible after the land is ready to be worked, wheat, oats, peas, then barley.
2. Plant potatoes and corn when the land is warm and mellow.
3. Should the season be late work on such small areas of land at one time as can be seeded before bad weather sets in.
4. Should it happen that work is started before the field is all quite ready, the camp places should be frequently harrowed until the moisture content is just right for it to break up nice.
5. Roll all new meadows as soon as they are firm enough to carry the horses. This will greatly increase the yield of clover.
6. Sow mixtures, equal parts of wheat oats and barley; or equal parts oats, barley, and peas or vetches. They yield more than either one alone and can be used for soiling or pasture if necessary.

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole head of a family or any male over sixteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but no proxy is permitted in certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the country.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after carrying homestead patent; also to carry on cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
