The latest news, first of all.

There were no Chicago Market Quotations in this morning's despatches to The Guardian.

CAT ATTACKS WOMAN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Jennie Brilliant of 1703 Washington avenue was subjected to a vicious attack by a large cat tonight, and during her struggle with the crazy creature she received fully 100 scratches, nearly every part of her face and neck being torn by the animal's claws.

Two of the cat's kittens had been killed during the fray by Mrs. Brilliant's dog, the police say, and in that way they account for the feline's anger.

Mrs. Brilliant lives on the top floor of the Washington avenue house, and it was while she was ascending the flight of stairs leading to her apartment that the animal sprang upon her head from the upper landing. Frantic from pain and fear the woman ran into her kitchen and tried to drag the beast off. For fully five minutes the cat maintained its hold and during that time inflicted the scratches and pulled out considerable hair.

When the owner of the cat learned of its death, she hurried to the Tremont station and, according to the officers, asserted that her neighbor had willfully thrown the cat out of the window, and asked to have the matter investigated.

LIBERTY SPELLS LOYALTY: BASIS OF IMPERIAL UNITY.

OTTAWA, Oct. 5.—The fact that England trusted Canada and granted her autonomous Government has converted the relentless and ill-feeling of former days into a deep and abiding loyalty among all Canadians to the Motherland. Let England trust the Irish people as she has trusted Canadians. Let her appeal to the hearts of the Irish and there will be a like glorious response. All Ireland asks is full and equal justice, the right to manage her own affairs, just as we in Canada manage our affairs. It is to me the only dark spot in British Government today that Ireland is not given the right of local self-government. Let that be granted as it has been done in Canada and in South Africa, and I am sure there will follow among the Irish people an abiding loyalty to the British Crown content with British rule and adherence to Imperial unity, just as that result has followed the granting of autonomy to the people of Canada. Liberty spells loyalty.

In the above words Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in the Russell Theatre tonight unequivocally endorsed T. P. O'Connor's bill for Home Rule for Ireland. At the conclusion of Mr. O'Connor's address to an audience of two thousand, Sir Wilfrid moved a vote of thanks to the speaker, and his voicing of Canadian sympathy for Ireland's cause was loudly cheered.

Mr. O'Connor's address followed closely the lines of his address in Toronto last week. At the conclusion of the meeting subscriptions totalling \$1,100 were received towards the Irish Home Rule fund.

A MILLIONAIRE COMMITS SUICIDE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Frank Lupton the millionaire, and president of the Lupton Co., publishers of the People's Home Journal, committed suicide last night by cutting his throat in his home.
