Speed Race As Seen by P.E.I. Man At Daytona Beach

A friend in Summerside received a clipping from Mr. T. Arthur Dawson of Albany, P. E. Island, of an account of Sir Malcolm Campbell's activities in his racing model "Bluebird" on Daytona Beach, Florida.

Mr. Dawson, with his wife and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Dawson of Albany, St. Peterburg, took a party over in his car to Daytona Beach to see the speed king, Sir Malcolm Campbell in his racing car "Bluebird". DAYTONA BEACH, March 4.—The prince of speed put his foot down all the way today, not on the throttle of hard-pressed old Bluebird, but flat on continuation of record runs on Daytona's sands until the beach definitely improves.

That might be today—With the low tide at 1:07 p.m.—or it might be 25 years from now, but hot or cold, high water or low, the big blue thunder-wagon stays in the garage until there is no danger of Sir Malcolm Campbell's eyeballs flying out, his head getting torn away by the wind, juncos breaking straps that hold him in the cockpit and hurling him into the neighboring ocean.

The slim Englishman, who will stand just so much of anything, including behind-the-hand heckling of local officials who insist on telling him what he's doing wrong, and "swivel chair athletes who hold their medals at 80 miles an hour, raced once down the beach yesterday. He hit 270 miles an hour, a shade under the record, but for the second straight day he was in trouble all the way.

Nearly Gassed by Fumes

broke loose on both sides of his motor, and he was nearly gassed by fumes that poured into his cockpit. Yesterday, the beach was so rough that half his time his head was jounced above the level of his windshield, the pressure nearly scalping him. His goggles were driven down over his nose and mouth, almost choking him, he skidded after a bump and swerved badly after another; his tires were cut, and the tread was torn completely from one of them. Even so, a return run north which he refused to make under the conditions, would have returned him a new record if he could have clipped .17 seconds of his southward time through the measured mile.

So today Sir Malcolm, smiling gently to all but very firm, called a halt.

"I won't drive Bluebird again until the beach is considerably better," he said. "The car is marvelous, I feel fine, but the fact is that while this beach is grand for average speeds, it simply won't do at speed above 270 miles an hour."

Drove High on Course

As a result there was a great do in hotel lobbies as the local authorities who worship the racing strand and can't bear to hear a word that even qualifies perfection, quibbled querulously with one of the two living men who have driven 200 miles an hour on land, survivor of 30 years of racing. They said he drove too high on the course, keeping away from the water and that was the reason why he hit rough spots and lost at least 25 miles an hour through slippage of his wheels.

Campbell explained patiently that at 270 miles an hour you get 18 feet off your course sometimes with ease and tremendous celerity.

As to Bluebird's ability to break the present record, Campbell doesn't retain a single doubt, given proper conditions under him.

"You don't spend \$50,000 on a trip over here unless you know that," he said. "If Bluebird won't do 275 you can have her."

SHANGHAI, March 12.—Enthusiastic plans are under way here to make China hockey conscious. Construction has started on Shanghai's first artificial rink which will have an ice surface of 200 by 85 feet with accommodation for hockey teams or 700 skaters and 4000 spectators. Hitherto skating has been confined in a general way to Tian-sin and Beijing and other centres of north China and Manchuria.

MARKETING ACT DESIGNED TO AID FARMERS

Legislation Would Provide Equitable Means For The Distribution of Products.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

TORONTO, Mar. 11.—To provide a steady flow of agricultural products and assure distribution of these products were the main aims of the natural products marketing act, Hon. Robert Weir, Dominion Minister of Agriculture, told the Canadian Club here today.

"If the farmer can go about his work knowing he will not be exploited," said Mr. Weir, "he will put more into his efforts and will be happier at heart."

Mr. Weir said changing conditions had confronted the government with a serious agricultural marketing problem. In 1929, Canada sold to the United States 250,000 head of cattle and calves and in 1930 with the new United States tariffs this market was practically closed.

As a result of the Ottawa Trade Agreements Canada could ship 280,000,000 pounds of bacon a year to the United Kingdom. But Great Britain wanted a high quality product and due to home consumption, this was lacking for export. The United Kingdom also welcomed Canadian apples but threatened to place a barrier on the fruit due to maggot infections.

These were problems with which the Department of Agriculture were faced, stressed Mr. Weir, who commended the farmers on their co-operation to raise the standards of their products.

Assassin Suspect Is Deported

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

VATICAN CITY, March 10.—A Mexican named Carlos Roberto Murgay, who was arrested four days ago at the Vatican after several attempts to see Pope Pius, sailed from Trieste today on the S. S. Saturnia.

Vatican and Italian police announced that his departure from Italy closed an incident which at first seemed like an attempt on the life of His Holiness.

Italian police questioned Murgay for a whole day after his arrest, having found a long sharp stiletto inside his shirt while on the Vatican premises.

They did not disclose what they discovered concerning the man's affiliations, revealing only that he was a Mexican and a Catholic.

Soviet Press Irked By German Report

MOSCOW, March 11.—The official Soviet press today accused Germany of using its "propaganda machine" to diffuse the idea war between the U. S. S. R. and Japan is inevitable. On the contrary, it declared, relations with Japan are improving.

At the same time Russian newspapers labelled as a malicious invention German reports Joseph Stalin and other Soviet leaders had decided to make a play for British and other support by spreading a false impression Communism is in a period of self-liquidation.

The Communist press directed its attack at an article said to have been printed in the Volkischer Beobachter, German National Socialist organ.
