AMONG THE HORSES

The Grand Circuit horses are at Pittsburg this week.

Frank Fox won another race with Miss Elmarch at Holyoke, Mass., last week, taking the 2 1/4 mile in 2:17.

Martha Dignest surprised the talent at the Caribou, Me., meeting last week by winning the 2 1/2 mile in 2:18 1/2.

Wilkes Brewer, after losing two heats to Inia Jay at Lima, cracked out a third mile in 2:08 1/2, and was back again the fifth in 2:08 1/2. Remarkable trotting for a half-mile track.

There will be races on the Driving Park at Georgetown on Monday that promise to be highly interesting. The prizes offered are good, and the track is declared to be in excellent condition. No doubt the attendance will be large.

Wearly Willie by Sir William, formerly owned in Nova Scotia, won the 2 1/2 mile class at Bangor the other day, defeating Prince Bingen, Miss Colombo, Miss Peter Bell, Ewing and Argot Miller in 2:24 1/2, 2:23 1/2, 2:23 1/2.

Pearl Pick, 2:12 1/2, owned by W. P. Alexander, of St. John, the other day presented her owner with two well-bred colts. Twin foals are unusual in this part of the Canadian racing belt. Pearl Pick has participated in many races in the neighboring province, and is well and favorably known to followers of the racing game.

The races at St. John last week attracted considerable attention, and the finishers in some of the events were close and exciting. The 2:18 trot and pace, the feature event of the winning day, was won by Major Wellington, the Brighton colt. After Orwell Belle had taken the first of the four heats trotted. The best time was 2:23 1/2. The second day Tapocia, another Monoton horse copped the free-for-all at her dropping the first heat to Bob Mac in 2:30, which was the best time of her race. Bingen Light won the 2:28 trot and pace in 2:25 1/2 and Lyle Smoke the 2:25 trot and pace in 2:24 1/2. The Charlottetown Driving Club will stage a series of races on the track of the Charlottetown Driving Park Association on Monday, August 21st, when the Scottish Clans foregather. At the time of writing the program had not been made public but the races alone will in all likelihood be worth coming many miles to see.

The Grand Circuit Meeting at Kalamazoo closed on Saturday with three exciting races. The feature event was the Michigan Railway Company's \$2,000 purse. The winner of the race was the horse which the final summary showed had won the most money, the honor going to Lindsey with \$600 to his credit. Brisac was second with \$550 and Grand Chimes third with \$380. The best time was 2:08 1/2. Charlie Valentine won the 2:08 pace in 2:03 1/2 with Goldie C. and the 2:19 pace in 2:07 1/2 with Miss Rejected.

The \$3,000 free-for-all pace was the feature of the Grand Circuit program at Kalamazoo on Wednesday of last week and was won by the Indiana pacer Single G. His third successive victory this season in winning the first heat he paced in 2:00 flat, the fastest heat of the year. "Pop" Geers after having been out of the sulky for several weeks on account of injuries sustained at Cleveland, made his 1916 race debut behind Napoleon Direct in the last pace, and electrified the crowd by landing his horse first in the second heat, beating Single G. by a narrow margin in 2:01 1/2.

It is more than probable that no other farm in the province can so many high-class trotters and pacers be seen as are present at Bideford Farm. Here is a list:

All the mares mentioned above have been mated with Captain Aubrey.

Grand Chimes, winner of the Taverst stake at Detroit is a Lustran trotter. He made his first appearance in public at Jackson, Miss., in October, 1914 and was last in a four horse race the only time he started. Last year he made a long and not very successful campaign through the west and south, trotting seven heats and carrying a record of 2:14 1/2. He began early this season, trotting half a dozen races on Michigan and Ohio half mile tracks before the Grand Circuit opened, winning all but one of them. His sire, Kentucky Chimes, was a full brother to The Queen 2:10 1/2, winner of the \$10,000 race at Detroit a few years ago, by Chimes, out of Queenie King by Mambrino King. Bear Wood the dam of Grand Chimes, was by Grand Baron, 2:12 1/2, son of Baron Wilkes 2:18.

In the race in which the season's trotting record as well as the record for the stake was broken, the chestnut mare Mabel Frask, driven by Walter Cox, won the \$10,000 Free-For-All Stake for 2.05 trotters, the features of the Grand Circuit card at Recreation Park, Kalamazoo, on Thursday of last week. Starting a \$200 to \$50 favorite in the auctions, the chestnut mare demonstrated that she is the class of all the stake trotters of the season, landing the second heat in 2:03 1/2, the fastest trotting heat of the year, and the record for the Paper Mills Stake, St. Francis from the Geers stable, was the contender but the stallion was no match for the mare from the east. The 2:05 pace, raced the same day went the limit and was taken by Lilia Patchen which capped the last three heats. The winners best time was 2:06 1/2. The best time of the race was 2:03 1/2, made by The Savoy which won the second heat. Joe Patchen II was distanced in the third heat.

Miss Harris M., winner of the \$5,000 Board of Commerce purse for 2.06 pacers at Detroit in 2:01 1/2, 2:01 1/2 and 2:04 1/2, is a converted trotter. As a two year old she finished second in 2:37 1/2 and 2:26 1/2. In a race for trotters at Dallas, Texas her only start in 1916. In letting her change her gait after this performance Alonzo McDonald, her trainer, may have robbed her sire of another 2:10 trotter, but he seems to be in a fair way to add a 2:00 pacer to Peter the Great's list by way of compensation. The champion four year old filly is owned by S. A. Fletcher the Indianapolis banker, breeder and turfman who owns her sire. She took a record of 2:07 1/2 as a three year old, but was not very successful as a campaigner, having won only two races out of seven. The first of these was at the Empire Track, in New York, where she placed a mile in 2:07 1/2. At Cleveland, her first start this season, she finished second three times in succession in 2:04 1/2, 2:02 1/2 and 2:04 1/2. Miss Harris M., was bred by A. T. Harrie of Versailles, Ky., and was sired by Mary Allen Stout by Ondale, 2:32 1/2, son of Orward, 2:25 1/2 by George Willis 2:22, the sire of Onward.

The sweepstakes race for three year old trotters at Detroit for the first of the season, General Watts 2:08 1/2, of the five colts and fillies that started, three were his offspring and among them were the winners of first and third money. Harold's Creek the colt that outlasted and defeated the Cleveland winner, Expressive Lou, 2:08 1/2, trotting the third heat in 2:10, now looks like the best three year old in sight. If the report is true that he moved the last half of the second heat in 1:01 1/2. This colt was bred and owned by Henry A. Bell, of Harrod's Creek, Ky. He is eligible to start in the \$15,000 Kentucky Futurity, and if he should win it as now seems possible, the victory would be another crumb of comfort to the small breeder of trotting horses. Like Peter Duryea the breeder of the season's best two year old, Mary Coburn 2:10 1/2, Mr. Bell nominated the producer of only one mare in the futurities, and though some of the big breeders had close to one hundred each, he seems to have drawn a capital price. Axales 2:23 1/2 the dam of Harrod's Creek, is a daughter of Chimes 2:30 1/2 and is sired by Zenobia 2:22, by Prince Regent 2:16 1/2, son of Mambrino King. The colt started in two races last year, winning one and in the other forcing out Bingen Silk in 2:14 1/2. In an exhibition against time he gained a record of 2:14 1/2 at Lexington. Before the Grand Circuit opened this year he won a race at Toledo in 2:15 1/2 and 2:17 1/2, losing the second heat to Martinus in 2:14 1/2 on a half mile track.

Two trotters entered the 2:10 list at the first meeting of the year in the Grand Circuit. "The number" is said to be unprecedented for five days of harness racing. The fastest of the newcomers is Mabel Frask whose record dropped from 2:14 1/2 to 2:06 1/2, and dropped again to 2:05 1/2 when she won the \$10,000 race at Detroit. This five year old daughter of Peter the Great 2:07 1/2, was bred by W. C. Brown, then President of the New York Central Railroad. She earned a record of 2:23 1/2 against time as a two year old at County Fair out at Indiana, Iowa, where Mr. Brown now keeps his trotters, and at three years old she made a long campaign winning only one race, however, and with it a record of 2:14 1/2. Last year she started only once in the \$10,000 race at Columbus, where she forced Peter Scott out in 2:07 and 2:08 1/2. Walter Cox who now trains her, was said to have trimmed her a mile around 2:05 in her work last fall. He has entered her in all the big "stakes" to which she was eligible, and she is proving to be the best in her class. She is in line to win a very large amount of money before the season ends at Atlanta.

Her dam, Miss Natalia was by Nutwood, 2:18 1/2 out of Lou 2:17 1/2, by W. Y. Stone 2:27, and she is out of the famous Jessie Pepper by Mambrino King. In the first heat of her race at Cleveland Mabel Frask was beaten only by a neck by St. Francis in 2:04 1/2.

The complete program of racing for the Halifax Exhibition Sept. 13th to 21st has been prepared and is as below. There are in all 19 races, including

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REVENUE FROM CROWN TIMBER LANDS.

Since Confederation, in 1867, Quebec has derived a total direct revenue to the provincial treasury of more than \$40,000,000 from the sale of cutting privileges on Crown timber lands. The revenue from this one source now averages well over \$1,500,000 annually. The area of Crown land under license to cut timber is approximately 44,500,000 acres, while 78,000,000 acres remain unlicensed. About 6,000,000 acres of timber land in the province are in private ownership.
