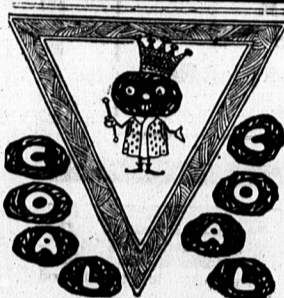

Wills Of Recluse Revealed Fortune

CHICAGO, January 25.—For a score of years, Mary E. Sterling, French, aged recluse, lived in the attic of her boarded-up tumbledown house in Park Ridge, a suburb. She left and entered by a ladder drawing it up after her. She died on January 6, leaving three wills of clashing provisions, safety deposit boxes in which \$50,000 in securities have been found, tax receipts for property in Massachusetts and papers indicating she may have possessed a fortune, it was disclosed today. Weirdest of her legacies were two grave-like mounds each marked with a stick with a teacup over the end in the back yard. The police will dig into these, hoping to find something to shed light on the disappearance of her husband 19 years ago. It was after he left that she lived 29 years hoarded up. —SENATOR McARTHUR HELPS OUT—Through the efforts of Senator McArthur, quite a number of passengers from abroad who had arrived in Summerside Saturday night late, were able to get through to their destinations in West Prince on Sunday. Some of these passengers had been called home to attend the funerals of immediate relatives and were very anxious to proceed to their homes. Upon being informed by the local railway authorities that a train could not be put through, Senator McArthur took the matter up with Mr. W. U. Appleton, going so far as to pledge his personal guarantee for the train. Upon getting permission from Mr. Appleton, he could not get a complete train crew at Summerside to act but finally secured a crew and train to come through from Summerside and St. John's, taking the passengers from St. John's West. Needless to say the passengers appreciate very highly Senator McArthur's efforts in their behalf.

—NEW TOWN COUNCIL—Tuesday last was nomination day for the Town of Montague and to the surprise of many of the citizens passed off without the excitement of an election, although at times it was thought that the Town would be subjected to such an expenditure. Although not without considerable reluctance on the part of the citizens, after a strenuous year's work, the old staff of councillors were finally allowed to resign, the new councillors being elected by acclamation. If any Town ever elected its leading citizens to manage its affairs, such is certainly the case with the Town of Montague for the year just entered upon. When the following gentlemen will occupy their seats at the Council board for ward one Messrs. George P. Thompson, George McIntyre and H. J. Mabon; Ward two, John W. Campbell, Joseph H. McGregor, and William Curren, gentlemen of the highest standing in the community, and if the affairs of the Town of Montague will be handled with the precision and economy which these gentlemen exercise in the management of their own affairs, then the financial outlook for the Town of Montague is indeed a bright one. While the former Councillors were finally allowed to resign, they were not the case with Mayor McKinnon—a largely signed petition by the citizens of both wards one and two asking for his re-election as a direct result of the splendid services he rendered to the town during the past year—made such a procedure impossible on his part—and today the citizens of Montague are proud to again acclaim him as their Chief Executive, a successful man from every standpoint, his impartiality and gentlemanly conduct in the capacity of chairman at almost all our public functions, especially the political meetings has done more to merit for him the highest position which Montague can bestow than any of the other many excellent traits of which he is possessed. The financial statement of the past year now in the hands of the ratepayers, which shows a splendid surplus over all expenditures including the water tanks costing, nearly \$1600. It clearly shows the rigid economy which was exercised by the outgoing councillors and when the government grant of \$125 towards the Post Office sidewalk is received, nearly \$800 in cash will be at the disposal of the new councillors—a splendid showing indeed. The dangerous practice of driving through the town without bells, especially country people, is to be put a stop to, the next offender will be haled before our Town Magistrate who will relieve him of any surplus dollars he may have.—J.
