FIELD DAY AT RED POINT About seventy people attended the Field Day at Red Point on the farm of Mr. Nelson R. Stewart on Tuesday, Aug. 26. This large attendance such a busy time clearly demon-

strates the popularity not only of the work of the station but of the operator. The various lines of work on the station were fully explained to those present. Of special interest were the lime plots, the fodder, corn alfalfa and potato plots. Lectures were

given by J. A. Clark and Mr. Louis Roper, while a lamb grading demonstration was put on by Mr. Frank Baird, sheep and swine, promoter for the province. Mr. Baird clearly demonstrated the type of lamb required by the markets at the present time and also gave some hints on the breeding and care of market lambs. Mr. Baird in addition pointed out the benefits to be accrued from the use of the new concrete sheep dipping tank recently put in at the station. After the Field Day a dainty lunch was served by the Women's Institute.

FIELD DAY AT WOOD ISLANDS For attendance and interest shown the Field Day at Wood Islands on the farm of Mr. Alexander Matheson, on Monday, Aug. 25th, was one of the best held in the Province during the season. The illustration station is situated on a very poor field, but the results obtained to date by good cultural practices have been such as to gain the interest and confidence of the neighbours. The following programme was followed:

A review of the station fields, gardens and test plots. This included a half acre field of rape—a crop grown for sheep and swine pasture; plots comparing manure and fertilizer for potatoes; plots comparing concentrated fertilizer with the regular chemicals on potato; tuber unit potatoes; and lime and check plots in the different station fields. These latter two were very pronounced. The treatment which each field received as well as special peculiarities of each crop was given by the supervisor.
