LONDON, Dec. 16—Lady Constance Foljambe, who last July disappointed the Rev. A. H. K. Hawkins by not marrying him, and went away to the country, is now Mrs. Hawkins. The couple were married on Monday.

The marriage was to have taken place on July 3rd last at one fashionable St. Peter's Eaton Square Church, and a big crowd of society people had gathered to witness the nuptials of the half-sister of the Earl of Liverpool, controller of the King's household, to the clergyman.

After a wait at the church of about an hour the minister sent a note to the Earl of Liverpool. He replied that his sister had gone shopping earlier in the day and had not returned home. Lady Constance had done squally startling things before, having at one time climbed the steeple of Whitehall church. The bridegroom is 16 years and the bride 22. His income is about \$915. Last summer the size of the minister's income was believed to have had something to do with the disappearance of Lady Constance.

RUSSIA AND THE STATES ABRIGATION OF TREATY.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 19.—Commenting upon the abrogation of the treaty of 1852 by President Taft, the Novoe Vryema declares that the United States is ruined by its bankers, and that their protest against Russian alleged crimes against the Jews has led to the present action. Russian diplomats concede that the United States has acted wholly within its rights and no ill-feeling whatsoever has been caused.

FORONTO CLUBS DROPPED FROM ASSN.

MONTREAL, December 17.—At a meeting of the National Hockey association held last night it was decided to drop the two Toronto clubs out of the organization for the present season and to play a triple schedule, including only Quebec, Ottawa, Canadiens and Wanderers. This action was necessary, owing to the inability of the contractors to complete the Toronto rink in time for hockey until late in February at the very earliest, while it was also found impossible to arrange to play the Toronto home games on Boston ice, as had been proposed. With the Tecumsehs and Torontos out of the National Hockey association a number of good players will be unable to find berths for the winter and it is thought that Eddie Norman, who has been through Ontario and Quebec attempting to recruit players for the maritime league, will have less difficulty than he has so far experienced.

BOSTON SHIPPING AND FISHING NEWS.

BOSTON, Dec. 16.—Ten fishing vessels arriving at T. wharf yesterday had a sufficient amount of fish for the day. The receipts consisted of 210,000 pounds of haddock, 80,800 pounds of cod, 17,200 pounds of hake, 8,800 pounds of pollock and 11,200 pounds of cusk. The Ethel B. Penney had 10,000 pounds of cusk and the Genest, 1,200 pounds of cusk. Dealers' prices yesterday: Haddock 4c., cod 5 1/2c., markets 3 1/2c., steak pollock 3 1/2c., hake at from 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c., and steak cusk 2 1/2c. a pound.

DENY USING DUM-DUMS.

ROME, December 15.—The Italian Government has issued an official denial that its troops in Tripoli are using dum-dum bullets, as has been stated in Constantinople. No military operations were reported today. The Italian troops hold all the country from Mazara, on the extreme west, to Lake Mellana, on the east. It is reported that the main body of the Turks has retired on Gharian, leaving a small advance body at Azizia. The Italian press is calling for the formation of a colonial army of 50,000 men.

CALGARY, December 15.—C. E. McPherson, assistant passenger traffic manager of the C. P. R., Winnipeg, is in the city today, and stated that arrangements are being made to place a number of additional local trains between Calgary and Vancouver during the coming summer, owing to the greatly increased traffic.

IRISH HOME RULE BILLS HAS BEEN DEFEATED

LONDON, Dec. 14.—Replying to a question by Wainwright Astor, Unionist member for Plymouth in the House of Commons, tonight, Mr. Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, said the Home rule bill had been drafted, but had not yet been made public before the adjournment of parliament, for the Xmas holidays.

MANY PHYSICAL DEFECTS AMONG SCHOOL CHILDREN

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 14.—In 4,744 medical inspections of school children, as reported by Dr. Struthery to the management committee of the board of education today, there were 2,993 physical defects found. Defective vision was discovered in 157 cases. Complete physical examination was given in 938 cases, in which 1,225 defects were found, 387 being of defective teeth only. Disease was found in 220.

HE CALMED HER FUSSINESS.

A somewhat fussy elderly lady had asked the conductor for a transfer. "You'll be sure to tell me when we come to my transfer station, won't you, conductor?" she asked sweetly. "Yes'm," said the conductor wearily.

The next time he passed through the car the elderly lady, remembering the ways of conductors, said to him again: "You won't let me go past my transfer station, will you, conductor? You'll be sure to tell me when I get there, won't you?" The conductor sighed and looked at her gently and sadly. "I won't have to tell you, 'cause you'll ask me every time we come to a transfer station if that's where you get off." —Exchange.

HOW MUCH MONEY DO YOU CARRY.

(Philadelphia Press.) A New York man, travelling with his wife, had \$1,800 in his pocket for expenses. The train was wrecked, his wife injured, and he lost the money.

Did he carry more than was reasonable? The railroad held he did. It promptly paid damages for his wife's injuries, but it refused to reimburse him for his cash loss. Judge and jury held that \$1,800 was no more than a man could reasonably carry. The first appellate court has sustained this verdict, but on a divided vote. One learned judge held that a man with \$1,800 in his "roll" invited perils which a railroad could not be asked to make good. In England or in France this court would never have decided on this issue. Men with money carry much more over and about with them there than here. The bank account habit is almost universal in this country. Checks are used here for small sums for which no one thinks of drawing a check abroad. Foreign banks would not stand the small checks common here, since in 1893 the banks in our cities asked their customers to draw checks for all payments, instead of getting cash. The check habit and the ease with which checks are cashed have greatly reduced the amounts men and women carry. The "big roll" is rare outside of some callings where ready cash is needed. Savings banks and building associations absorb the sums once hoarded in the house or carried on the person. It is a healthy change, and the men, like this New Yorker, who carry \$1,800 on a trip, are very few in number.
