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See Port Arthur Juniors Probable Hockey Champions

(By The Canadian Press) PORT ARTHUR, Feb. 3 — Many fans are jumping aboard the Port Arthur west end Bruins' bandwagon as this season's probable Western Canada junior hockey champions — or even Dominion titles.

Without a junior titleholder since Port William captured the Dominion crown in 1922, Thunder Bay sportsmen this year have gone all out in an effort to build a winning club—and results to date have been pleasing.

Bruins, undefeated so far in Lakehead League play, have impressed ralhbirds further by chalk-up 13 victories in 17 exhibition games against junior and senior opposition. Two of the four defeats were by senior clubs.

In seven exhibition games against junior clubs from the Manitoba League, the high-flying Lakeheaders swept through with six triumphs against one defeat. They whipped Moose Jaw Canucks, co-leaders with Regina Pats in the Saskatchewan Junior League and last year's Western finalists, in four straight contests, then took two out of three from the Pats.

Their plunge into senior company caused some confusion when, after taking a 15-3 trouncing from Port Arthur Bearcats, they walked off Fort William Legion 8-5. They also dropped a 6-5 decision to Swift Current Indians of the Saskatchewan Senior B. League.

EASTERN PANTHERS BACK IN MARITIMES

FREDERICTON, Feb. 4 (CP)—Wildlife is coming back into its own in New Brunswick.

First it was announced that the eastern panther, believed extinct for at least 60 years, had reappeared in the province.

Then came word that the bounty on wildcats had been raised from \$5 to \$10 because the vicious cats were gaining in numbers and killing off young deer who made easy prey in heavy winter snow.

Panthers were discovered in the province last year but the find was kept secret from the public because forestry officials feared impulsive trophy hunters would rush out and kill the survivors.

There are no game laws prohibiting the killing of the eastern panther — known as "Indian devil" — but officials have appealed to hunters not to kill the animals.

New Brunswick has a responsibility to preserve the panther," says B. S. Wright, director of the Northeastern Wildlife Station of the Wildlife Management Institute.

"They are shy and harmless and have not been known to kill livestock. From a natural history standpoint it would be as great a shame to kill an eastern panther as to destroy a mastodon should one ever be found alive," he said.

Ontario Anglers And Hunters Meet

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Feb. 3 (CP)—Ontario provincial air service will be increased from 28 to 40 planes this spring, Hon. Harold Scott, Lands and Forests Minister, last night told the annual banquet of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.

All of the additional planes will be available for game, and fish patrol services, he said.

Mr. Scott said he favored permanent opening dates for angling seasons. He cited trout as an example.

"May 1 is the deadline for their protection," he said. "Following that date they are fair game. We know that their popularity is bringing a pressure which they can hardly withstand."

"Our stocking of 3,000,000 yearling speckled and some 400,000 brown, rainbow and kennebecs is the direct answer which we are directing to this species."
