Toronto Exchange

Toronto, Jan. 23—(CP)—Toronto declines predominated at the end of today's session of the Toronto stock exchange. The gold and base metal issues harbored the losses while the industrial shares were unchanged in the previous session. Volume was the second heaviest of the week at 171,000 shares.
The main trading action developed in two or three of the junior issues. Ontario Nickel traded in volume of 52,000 shares and firmed 1-4 to 9 1-4. It touched 10 on the five member of the group, advanced 1-4 to 24 1-2. In the secondary group Marquette Gold firmed 1-2 as a feature, trading about 500 shares on a drop of 5 cents to 2.05.
Senior base metals were in dull trade. Nickel and Smelters dropped 1-4 to 3-8 and Noranda firmed 3-4 to 48 3-4. Steep Rock, the most active member of the group, advanced 8 cents to 1.88. Ventures lost 5.
Utility and miscellaneous industrial stocks held slightly to the up side and other industrial groups were unchanged in the average.
Losses in points were showing at the close for B.C. Power, A. Bank of Toronto, Canada Foundry, A. Canadian, Celanese pfd, Goodhead pfd, Massey-Harris pfd and Toronto Mortgage Corporation.
McDougall-Scour sold off a fraction to a new low and Vermilata gained 1-4 in the afternoon. Other western oils were unchanged.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23—(AP)—The stock market merely drifted during the greater part of today's session but managed to close with slightly steeper tendencies.
Among Canadian stocks Distillers Seagram pfd declined 1-2 points to 75 to wipe out a good part of yesterday's gains while McIntyre Mines gained 1-2 point and Brazilian Tractor 3-8. Unchanged were Canadian Pacific, Distillers Seagram common, Dome Mines, International Nickel, and Hum Walkers.
Ralls, down most of the time, did better at the last and a handful of "blue chips" which recently have been under pressure managed to tack on 1 to 2 points or so. Minor fractional losses were plentiful.
The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up 1/4 of a point at 37.4. Dealings were exceptionally sluggish until the final hour when volume picked up a trifle. Transfers totaled 431,250 shares compared with 429,870 Thursday and were among the smallest for a five-hour stretch since last October.
Erie preferred "A" moved up a fraction when a \$5 dividend on this new issue—recapitalization was completed in December—was declared payable in four quarterly installments. Washb pfd was up 1-4 at a new 1941-42 top. Santa Fe edged forward along with N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Great Northern and Northern Pacific. General Steel Castings preferred

MONTREAL, Jan. 23—(CP)—Traders were cautious in dealings today on the stock market and issues moved in a narrow band with losses holding the edge over gains. Volume was swollen by the marketing of 4,500 shares of Industrial Acceptance "A" at its previous price level.
Losing stocks among industrials were St. Lawrence Corporation, Canada Cement preferred, Dosco "B" and Canadian Car. Algoma Steel was a stronger spot with a gain of a major fraction.
Noranda extended recent gains in metals but down were Consolidated Smelters, International Nickel and Bulolo. Imperial in oils sank to its lowest depth since June, 1940, but made a partial recovery. Shawinigan sold higher but was ex-dividend in utilities and Canada Steamship retrieved a fractional slip in carriers.
In the miscellaneous section Lake of the Woods picked up a point and Imperial Tobacco and Associated Br-wares were also approved. The Celanese issues were softer, the preferred dropping more than
