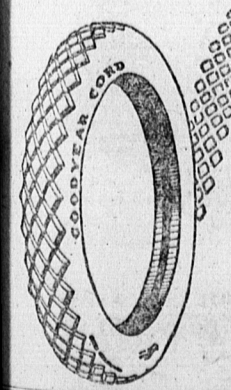

**ARCTIC EXPLORERS MAY SOON TRAVEL IN COMFORT.**  
**STOCKHOLM, May 27.**—A new type of motor-sleigh designed to provide the comforts of a Pullman car for Arctic explorers has been experimented with in the Arctic regions of Sweden and is now being perfected by the inventor, Mr. J. W. Sandstrom, chief of the Swedish weather bureau.

**THE NEW VEHICLE** is an adaptation of the principle of the tank. Sufficient supporting area is given to the caterpillar treads to carry a three-ton cargo over loose snow several feet in depth.

**A 36 horsepower gasoline motor** propels this strange craft at the rate of seven miles an hour. The interior of the car is fitted out compactly with folding beds, patent kitchen, and other special equipment which a scientist planned to have similar motor-sleighs in the explorer's train for the transportation of fuel and supplies.

**Preliminary experiments** with the new motor-sleigh have been carried on in deep snow near the town of Boden in northern Sweden.

**LAUSANNE, May 28.**—Inspired by American prohibition, the prohibitionists of Switzerland are engaged in a campaign to reduce the consumption of strong alcoholic drinks, and on June 3 referendum will decide the issue.

**THE PRIVATE** distilling of alcohol has increased so rapidly in recent years and the drinking of pure drugs of distilled liquor, which is given the popular name of "Schnapps," has become so widespread among the masses that the authorities have become alarmed. The medical profession has launched a movement for federal intervention and control.

**THE CONSUMPTION** of alcoholic drinks in Switzerland has reached the figure of a billion francs annually for a population of four million. The 1913 federation of Swiss physicians urged the government to interdict the manufacture, importation and sale of all distilled beverages. This was held to be too radical, but the campaign now has been vigorously reopened in order to obtain at least partial prohibition.

**THE MANUFACTURE** of alcohol is a state monopoly in Switzerland, and the government leases the right of distillation to private companies.

**THE PROPOSED LAW**, which parliament has already adopted, aims at a double object, the protection of the monopoly by the curbing of private distilling, and the reduction of opportunities for the consumption of alcohol. The local crusaders are collecting statistics of the good effects of prohibition in America to induce votes to support the bill.

## South American Athletes Look Good to French

PARIS, May 25.—Count de Ballot-Latour, member of the international Olympic committee, has returned from an extended tour of South America and gives an enthusiastic account of the progress made by South American countries in sports of all kinds and their expectations for the Paris 1924 Olympic games.

"Brazilians lead in rowing and swimming," he says "sports which are favored by their wonderful climate; agile and elegant, the Argentinians are the best sprinters; the Chileans, robust and powerful mountain men, are supreme in distance running; the Uruguayans are the best organized as far as method and training is concerned and their football is the best in South America."

Some of the records made in the sprint and middle distance show such improvement over the previous best marks that the South American nations may expect to be honorably represented in Paris in 1924.

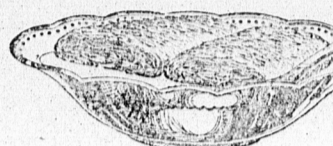

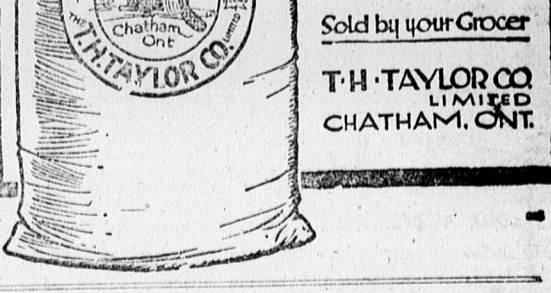
