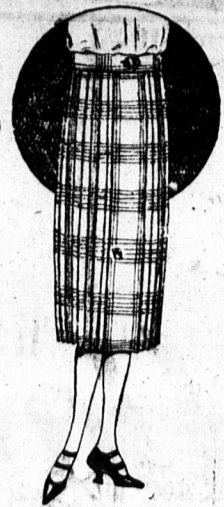

NEW PROPOSALS FOR SINN FEIN

LONDON, Nov 30—An anxious day in negotiations designed for the pacification of Ireland, ended last night with the hope that a complete collapse of the parleys might still be averted.

Premier Lloyd George immediately summoned the Sinn Fein delegates to consult with him, his ministers submitted to them the new proposals which, if they meet with approval of the Sinn Fein will be presented to Ulster officials before next Tuesday.

The nature of the alternative of proposals, will not be divulged, pending their consideration by the Sinn Feiners.

DIED IN SUMMERSIDE.— The death took place at her home in Summerside, Tuesday morning, after a lingering illness, of Mrs. Bernard Gallant, at the age of 81 years. There are left to mourn, her husband, four sons and two daughters. The funeral took place Wednesday morning to the R. C. Cemetery and was largely attended.

FISH SHIPMENTS.— Mr. S. C. Martin, travelling agent of the Canadian National Express Company, was in Summerside Friday, arranging for the transportation of fish from Summerside next month. Special cars of a type most suitable for the work, are being provided for the shipment of fish from Summerside this fall and already three carloads have been booked for shipment to various points in the United States.

THE CAT CAME BACK.— A resident of Summerside, wishing to get rid of a cat for which she had no longer any use, sent it to relatives in the western end of the province, some sixteen miles distant from Summerside. A day or so ago, much to her surprise, the cat was sitting on the back door-step, waiting to get admission to her former town home. The cat travelled the entire distance along the roads and by the roadside and with unfailing accuracy landed safely at her old home again.

LARGE FOX SHIPMENTS.— What is probably the largest number of foxes ever sent from Prince Edward Island at one time left on Saturday morning for the mainland by way of the Canadian National Express Company. There were two carloads in the shipment, containing more than 300 high grade foxes, made up of several different shipments and all consigned to various points in the United States. The principal shipments were made through W. Chester S. McLure of Charlottetown and John A. Lea of Summerside.

INTERESTING DEBATE.— A highly interesting debate took place in the Bedoune Young People's Society at Central Bedoune on Tuesday night last, the subject being "Resolved that the National Progressives should have the Government of Canada." The speakers on the affirmative were Messrs. Howard Schurman, Harold Leard, Gordon McCullum, and the speakers on the negative side were Miss Annie Linkletter, Miss Daisy Orr, Mr. Louis Pearson. Much eloquence was displayed by the speakers on both sides, but when it came to force of argument the judges were obliged to award the decision to the speaker on the negative side. The judges were: Messrs. A. E. Wright, T. J. Inman, Mrs. Melvin Johnson. The subject of the debate caused considerable excitement in the village and neighboring vicinity and long before the hour of opening the debate had arrived the room was packed to the doors. The hearty applause which the negative speakers frequently drew from the audience is looked upon as a pretty good omen of the results of the coming Election day. It is rumored the Secretary of the National Progressives for Prince East, as a result of the debate tendered his resignation to the Prince County Farmers' candidate, and that the latter is now seeking legal advice so as to ascertain as to whether or not he can be forced to withdraw his resignation.

THE ARTFUL DODGER

Speaking at Orana in the afternoon, the Prime Minister exposed the tactics that Mr. McKenzie King was adopting in order to avoid answering the challenge that had been made to him early in September, whether he stood by the Liberal platform that he had pledged himself to in August 1915, and which he had reiterated in the House of Commons in June 1920, or whether he declared that he would stand or fall by the platform of that convention.

Still Awaits Answer.— "I never heard of a 1917 free trade platform," continued the Prime Minister. I asked him if he was going to put implements and food stuffs, cement, fertilizers and pledged himself to do in August 1919 and I am still awaiting his answer. What do you think of the disposition of a political leader who has to misrepresent your question after two and a half months in order to enable him to answer it, and then supports a Liberal candidate whose main complaint is that the lowering of the tariff on agricultural implements, has thrown hands out to work and the chief plank of whose platform is for an increase in duty on implements."

Mr. J. D. O'Connell Arrives In Cuba

Mr. J. D. O'Connell, also known as "The Children's friend," "Santa Claus" and other like descriptive titles, arrived yesterday via the Key West boat, says the Havana News of Nov. 22.

Mr. O'Connell left here in July on his annual trip through the United States and Canada and through his benevolence, and with his own personal superintendence, or organization, there has been given picnics in 14 different places in 8 different states in the union and in 16 different places in 3 provinces in Canada. This is somewhat a lesser number than Mr. O'Connell usually gives, but moratoriums and financial stringencies strikes the font from which is obtained the money to provide picnics for children, the same as it strikes business.

Mr. O'Connell's specialty is picnics and outings for orphan children, and there is hardly a settlement of this class from Camaguey to Halifax but that has enjoyed the help of his wonderful personality, or his money, or both.

Mr. O'Connell's cattle ranches and game fields in Camaguey are operated by their owner with one set idea, and that is to turn in profit that is immediately devoted to making children happy, to probably supply the medicines necessary to save the life of some one's sick child, and other philanthropic work in the same line.

No one will ever know the vast amount of good that this great man has been the means of doing—he does not know himself—because who can tell with what fertility will the seed of advice germinated in the minds of his listeners, when surrounded by thousands of children he delivers an address or talk, full of encouragement to the individual child to do his best at all times—nothing more than that, that is the theme—"Do your best, and walk in the path the Master intended you to walk in." From those little talks which by the way have been listened to by considerably more than one million of children during the course of the years that this real live Santa Claus has been giving the picnics, there has resulted better men, better women and better citizens in general. The writer has had the privilege of seeing some of Mr. O'Connell's treasures, in the shape of letters that he has received from time to time, the letters being from people, some of them children and some parents, but all thanking him for the assistance he has given them in the way of encouragement on their hard road, some speak of the one bright day of their life—the day of the picnic—being the turning point of their life; because kind readers, you have to remember that not all children are as fortunate as those around you.

The vastness and extent of the work that Mr. O'Connell does can be better realized when we consider that at the children's picnic held in Rockwood Park, St. John, N. B. August 16th of this year, there was used over two tons of candy—not cheap or unhealthy goods, but the best of chocolates—500 quarts of ice cream, 500

against allowing liquor to be shipped in from outside points. The temperance advocates solicited Mr. O'Connell's assistance, and although it meant that he had to forsake his personal attention to some of his picnics, he took the stump, and for an entire month, spoke practically every day, he covered the province from end to end, speaking some days as many as 5 times, and each time to thousands of listeners, and each speech from one hour to three hours. The last week of the campaign Mr. O'Connell with his speaking and committee work spent from 16 to 18 hours a day.

The voting gave a majority for the temperance cause of over 25,000 votes, and although of course there were many other contributions, still he must say that if it had not been for the perseverant efforts of Mr. O'Connell and his forceful character, and his persuasive personality, the result might not have been the same.

Mr. O'Connell is leaving tonight for Camaguey to attend to his business there and to prepare for a referendum vote of the people of that province which would be taken on October 10th to decide the question of whether or not there would be a good vote which you might poll in your own interests on behalf of stable government.
