EDITORIAL NOTES.

The recent offer of a Maine man of a number of small prizes to the school children in his town who take the best care of their teeth during the summer vacation, is not regarded with favor by the local Dentist.

One of the latest lightning freaks was experienced by an Irish physician. While riding along the highway near Queenstown recently his wheel was struck and utterly demolished. The doctor received no injury except some bruises, on coming in contact with mother earth.

It is reported that a food shortage in the Klondike next winter is greatly feared by those conversant with the conditions in that region. There are many people there without work and without money, and it will be necessary to furnish them with transportation southward this summer or to feed them next winter.

The publication of the official report concerning the prevalence of leprosy in the province of Memel threatens to ruin the business of hotel keepers at the seaside resorts on the shores of the Baltic Sea. The authorities at these places are making strenuous efforts to convince the public that no leper ever saw the waters of this pleasant sea.

Women are working their way into many important positions in life. If the young lady, who, with forty four men, recently took the written examination before the State Board of Pharmacy permitting her to practice as a registered druggist and pharmacist, is successful, New Jersey will shortly have a female pharmacist.

Gen Leonard Wood, formerly colonel of the Rough Riders, who has been appointed military governor of Santiago, is a physician and his knowledge and experience as such especially fit him for successfully carrying out the sanitation of Santiago. The latest reports from there show no change in the situation as regards yellow fever. However, despite the filthy condition of the streets, there is but little fever within the city. The new governor may be depended upon to do everything possible in the way of cleaning the city, and it is believed that a widespread epidemic among the troops may be averted. The type of the disease continues mild, the mortality being very light. Out of 1,000 cases of yellow, malarial, and typhoid fevers and measles reported up to July 25th, there were only three deaths, according to the Siboney correspondent of The Sun. An epidemic is reported from Merida and other coast towns in Yucatan, brought probably from Cuba by the blockade runners.

SEA GOLD BUBBLE.

Work Suspended at Lubec, Maine.
 ST. JOHN, August 1.—A few days ago Lubec, promised to become a great centre of trade, for out of the waters that ebbed and flowed in and out its harbor was to be extracted gold at will. The people there had faith in the scheme, and everything was at fever heat. The fraud was well planned, and money was laid out regardlessly. A St. John workman who returned a couple of days ago from Lubec told a reporter that when he left on Thursday there were 650 men on the pay roll, and the lowest wages per day was \$1.50. There was a regular boom on. Cellars were dug for twelve homes for the company's employees, and the foundation was being laid for a big electric light station. There were forty masons at work. Water was brought in twelve miles by pipes, in fact the town assumed, instantly it may be said, all the luxuries of a metropolitan city. Now it is changed. It is supposed that some of the contractors will lose heavily, as they pushed the work regardless of anything.

The secret Chamber where the sea was made give up its gold was securely guarded, and a robust man kept sentry over the entrance. When anyone wanted to communicate with the manipulator an iron grating was opened by the guard and the message communicated through a tube. No one was permitted to enter and it is said that the only persons who succeeded in seeing the gold extractor in his mysterious work were several ladies, among them being a couple from St. John, who were on a visit to Lubec. When they entered some of the ladies noticed the extractor's face turned pale, but he was equal to the occasion, and extracted some of the precious metal for them.

While scientific papers state that the amount of gold in sea water varies all the way from 1.016 of a grain of gold on down to .150 of a grain. Dr. Jernegan knocked all their theories out, for while he was extracting gold, he managed always to have the brick of gold sent to Boston weekly, weighing about the same. The brick of \$2,000 received there last week did not vary two ciphers from the one sent the pre-

vious week. It now turns out that Mr. Jernegan was not the only person connected with the company who has departed for Europe recently. A Mr. Firmer, a friend of Mr. Fisher, Mr. Jernegan's associate, who was book keeper at the company's works at North Lubec, has sailed for Europe within two weeks for the purpose of getting married in England. Mr. Firmer has been connected with the company but a short time, leaving a position of about \$500 a year in Boston to go with Mr. Fisher. When he went to Europe he appeared to be most beautifully supplied with money.

Mr. Hueston, of Shulce, N. S., left St. John yesterday by the American boat for Lubec to look after nine cargoes of spilling which had been shipped to the Salts Company there.
 The following despatches throw further light on the company's affair:
 LUBEC, Me., July 31.—The surprise and excitement over the suspension of work on the plant of the Electrolytic Marine Salts Co. have in a measure subsided, and with the payment of the wages due the men employed by Contractor Shabanah, the town will resume its usual quietude. An interesting incident was the arrival here of a stranger who said he was from New York and who tried to talk the workmen into a demonstration against the company. The stranger was warned by Sheriff Mahinen and Contractor Shabanah to desist, and finally he took the steamer for Eastport.

Amesbury, Mass., July 31.—The directors of the Electrolytic Marine Salts Company met at Amesbury Beach this evening and issued the following statement to the stockholders:
 "The story printed in the New York Herald of July 31 is, in the minds of the directors, conclusive evidence of a conspiracy on the part of P. F. Jernegan, general manager, and C. E. Fisher, assistant general manager, to defraud the stockholders. They have undoubtedly left the country and disabled the electrical apparatus at plant No. 1. As soon as our suspicions were aroused we took active measures to apprehend the criminals and to protect the interests of the stockholders. Touching the secret process of the company, it should be said that it is yet to be ascertained that it is fully lacking in merit. It is the wish of the directors to meet the stockholders and a call for such a meeting will soon be issued.

The statement is signed by Arthur B. Ryan, president; Wm. R. Usher, treasurer; Albert P. Sawyer, director.
 Boston, Aug. 1.—The Herald to-day says: "A warrant for the arrest of P. F. Jernegan was asked for on Saturday and granted, if reports are true."
 Later a cablegram was written by Chief Watts, authorized by Lawyer M. O. Adams, of Boston, signed by Superintendent of Police Elridge and sent to the chief of police of Havre, France. It asked for the immediate arrest and detention of Jernegan upon his arrival in Havre.
