W. Orr Mulligan, was tendered the speaker.

RARE FIRST EDITIONS

LONDON, Feb. 20.—One of the rare first editions of English books that may some day soon be encountered at auctions, where collectors gather, is the Preliminary Report on the Census of England and Wales in 1921.

John Clifton's appetite for this work has considerably astonished the officials of the Stationery Office. In fact the first edition at a quarter, though it ran into many thousands, has long been sold out, and the authorities have had to order a second one.

The "preliminary report" gives the provisional tables of the population for England and Wales, that were the first fruits of the big count of three summers ago. It is a White Book of about 80 pages, 64 of which are crammed with statistics showing first the numbers and sexes of the inhabitants.

The first seven towns in their order are London, Birmingham, Liverpool, Manchester, Sheffield, Leeds and Bristol.

More than 18-1/2 million people live in the large towns (those over the 50,000 aggregate), or nearly half the total population of the country.

Durham is the only English county now in which men out number women.

HARD ON THE DOG

LONDON, Feb. 20.—An outpatient recently attended a London hospital, and complained that the medicine she had been receiving had not done her "ha porch of good."

On arriving home she saw that the dog had evidently been fighting, for he was covered with blood. Knowing that boric powder was good for bathing wounds, she prepared what she thought was a boric solution.

In her haste the lids of the boxes became confused and the dog was bathed with salts. Fortunately, salts, painful though they are when applied to wounds, have good healing properties, and boric powder taken internally, would not be so injurious as other powders.

When the patient was told of her mistake, she forgot her own complaint in her sympathy for her dog.

Ford on Democratic Petition in Michigan a Political Paradox

DETROIT, Feb. 21.—A political paradox looms ahead of the presidential primary in this state on April 7, with the possibility of President Coolidge being the choice of the Republicans of the state and Henry Ford, whose "I am for Coolidge" proved a political sensation recently being the Democratic choice.

A few days before Mr. Ford said: "I will not be a candidate against him on any ticket, whatsoever," Ford Petitions, circulated throughout the state were presented to the secretary of state as the candidate for the regular Democratic preferential choice. Having got this far, the Democratic leaders came to an abrupt halt with Mr. Ford's announcement that he was for Coolidge.

But they could not withdraw the name, as the law specifically states that only the candidate himself can do this right, and the petitions are presented and accepted. To date, Mr. Ford has not withdrawn his name, and has given no inkling that he intends to. Thus the Democratic backers of Mr. Ford found themselves in the unenviable position of having agitated and commended the candidacy of a man who expressed his sympathies all with the opposition.

While President Coolidge has been named as the preference of Governor Alex. J. Groesbeck and Burt D. Cady, chairman of the Republican state committee, United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson has whipped an organization into shape, named his county and state managers, established his headquarters and named Michigan as a battle ground by making one of his first campaign speeches here. Johnson supporters recall that Michigan expressed its presidential preference for the California Senator in 1920 and they say that that favorable sentiment still exists.

A significant point in connection with the Michigan state politics is the almost lack of early discussion of issues. The Teapot Dome disclosures created somewhat of a furor in Michigan political circles, mainly because they involved Edwin Denby, secretary of the navy, a Detroitite. The reaction in the case of Denby has been somewhat of a blotting out of political lines in going to the navy secretary's defense.

Judge Protects Wealthy From Enhanced Legal Fees

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., Feb. 21.—Declaring that "similar services have similar value for rich and poor alike," Judge Fuller of the common pleas court reduced an attorney's fee from the \$5,000 sought to \$1,000. Suit had been instituted for the collection of the \$5,000 fee for services and expenses in connection with the trial of a client from a state institution. Before rendering his opinion the court obtained figures from other members of the bar and found that fees on such cases ranged from \$500 to \$900.

After making the observation regarding similar service, the court said that "while the poor may be charged less, the rich should not be charged more than the service is reasonably worth, for this would be unethical and unprofessional. Nor can we doubt the value of freedom regained as a very material factor in this case, for on that standard, since the value of freedom like the value of life is beyond computation, the compensation of the attorney might easily lead to confiscation of the client's property although the services, as here, might involve no particular learning, skill, experience or difficulty."
