RCAF Observes Battle Of Britain Sunday At S'ide

With an impressive ceremony that included a parade, service in Memorial Square and a march past the R.C.A.F. station, Summerside, fittingly observed the Battle of Britain Sunday yesterday. During the proceedings nine Dakota aircraft, flew over in formation. The parade, headed by the Band of the 17th Recce Regiment and under command of Sqdn. Ldr. C.R. Brown, D.F.C., formed up on the High School grounds and marched by way of Summer Street to Memorial Park arriving there just before three o'clock. The ceremonies at the Park were conducted by Wing Cmdr. D.A. Willis, D.F.C., acting commanding officer at the Summerside station. Opening prayers were said by Rev. E.J. Barras and Rev. D.J. McNeill. The address for the occasion was given by Ft. Lt. G.B. Fee, Protestant padre of the station, who dwelt on the sacrifice of those who had fought the Battle of Britain and said that remembrance of that sacrifice could inspire us with humility. He said that our way of life is not truly Christian and in many ways is unworthy of the sacrifices made. "Our true memorial to the honored dead should be the dedication of our lives to live for the ideals and moral principles for which they gave their lives," he said.

Lambeth Conference. Attending the conference in Canterbury Cathedral, in company with 229 "old" bishops, which he said, referred to the number, not the bishops, before the vast communion of the Anglican Church, which they represented. He told of bishops from Africa (black), bishops of Asia (yellow), but some one said humorously "There are no yellow bishops" and bishops who had suffered heroically, in concentration camps. Bishops were there, who had travelled by air paid for by American soldiers in the Army of Occupation from Japan on behalf of fellow churchmen who had weakened under government pressure and now wished the church to re-instate them (which it did), and many others were there from all parts of the world, representing a host of men, women and customs, but all members of one great church. His Lordship told the congregation that everyone must do his or her part, that the great fabric of the church and Christianity may be kept whole and potent, throughout the world. Further illustrating his point, the bishop took his hearers to a scene far removed from Lambeth and Canterbury, he told of his visit to Coppermine, 1500 miles north of Edmonton where Canon Webster faithfully serves the native Eskimos in scattered settlements over weary miles of icy wastes, and of their joy at the first visit of a bishop in seven years that they might be confirmed and receive the full privileges of their church. They too, are a significant part of the fabric of the church.

Quebec Group Interested In Oyster Industry

Six business and professional men of Shawinigan Falls, Que., who are interested in the oyster industry of this Province, visited Summerside on Monday morning. The group, headed by Mr. Robert Bourassa, landed at the Summerside airport on Friday afternoon in two chartered aircraft and left on return yesterday. Others in the party were Emile Lavigne, L.A. Robillard, Robert Hebert, Arthur Lecourriere, J.C. Guillemette. Their host while here was Mr. W.B. McNeill, who has shipped Malpeque oysters to Quebec for many years. None of the group had ever been on the island before.

On Saturday morning Mr. McNeill took them to Malpeque Bay where they met Mr. Lorne Beaton, president of the P.E.I. Oyster Growers Association and some of the officers of the Association. Mr. H.V. Carr of the Department of Fisheries took them out in his boat and they were shown the operations of the industry at first hand. They expressed themselves as pleased with all they saw and indicated they would be purchasers of the famous Malpeque oysters for many years to come.

Saturday afternoon they visited Charlottetown and toured places of interest including the Confederation Chamber and Government House. In the evening they took in and enjoyed the horse races. On Friday in Summerside they visited the stores and were shown around the town. In the evening they attended the Legion carnival.

On leaving they were provided with a supply of oysters as well as some fresh lobsters to take back home with them. The pilots of the aircraft were J.D. McLaren and A.D. McLaughlin. While in Summerside they were registered at the Queen Hotel. - S

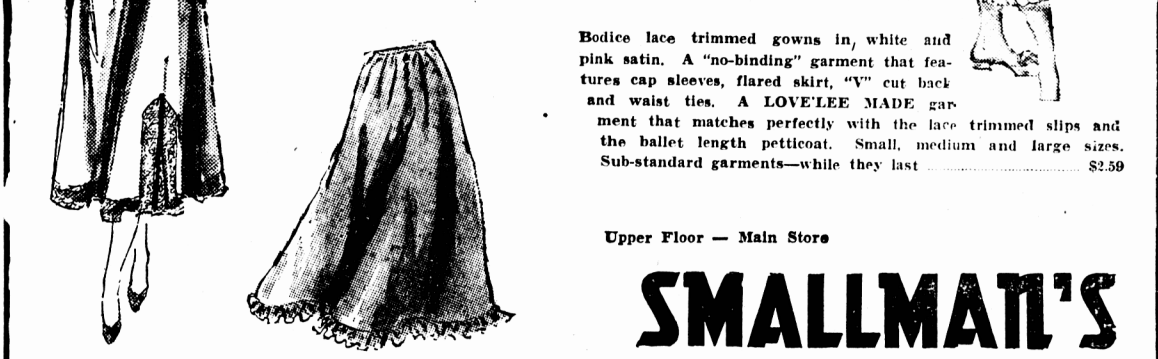

Successful Boxing Card At Summerside

A very successful boxing card under the sponsorship of the Summerside Legion was run off in the old curling rink in Summerside Saturday night. The largest crowd to see a boxing event in Summerside for some years watched the boys in action and some spirited contests resulted.

In the main bout "Big Boy" Peterson, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island heavyweight champion, won by a knockout from Sid Murray of Summerside. Murray, claiming a low blow, eged up writhing on the floor as the bell rang to end the fifth round. He was unable to come out for the sixth and last scheduled round so Peterson's hand was raised in token of victory. Peterson wore down his lighter opponent in the lightning and although Murray was floored in the first two rounds the Big Boy took the play away from him for the remainder of the bout.

Eugene Pendergast of Kensington won a unanimous decision from Emmett Gallant of Charlottetown in the semi-final four-rounder. Gallant gave away a lot of weight to his bulky opponent, sending Pendergast in the first round for a nine count. Pendergast got up off the floor, however, to punch out a clear-cut victory, sending Gallant to the canvas three times in the third round. Gallant made a split-second comeback in the final round but was helpless on the ropes as the bell ended the fight.

Harry Poulton and Bud Lund, both of Charlottetown, put on a smart three-round exhibition showing some clever weaving, ducking and jabbing but with little rugged battling in between.

"Sluggo" DeCoste (52) and Arnold MacAusland (56) both of Summerside, fought the card with a three-round go, MacAusland getting the nod from both judges.

George Grady (162) of Summerside won a unanimous decision from Austin Squarebriggs (156) of Charlottetown. Grady carried the fight to his taller opponent and won the first two rounds by fairly wide margins but Squarebriggs made a

much better showing in the final session. Mr. M. P. Titus, president of the Legion, thanked the crowd for their attendance on behalf of the Legion and Mayor J. Frank Arnett also spoke to the gathering, informing them that the receipts of the evening's entertainment was to be used to equip a Legion band for the Town of Summerside.
