Most Daring Man In Royal Air Force Sent To Singapore Naval Base

LONDON, April 24. — The most daring of all the "hell divers" of the Royal Air Force, Squadron Leader R. A. George, has been appointed to headquarters at Singapore.

Singapore is the strategic key to the East. When the plans for the equipment of the new naval base there are completed it will be the world's most formidable stronghold.

Increase of Royal Air Force strength is an essential part of the plan for the development of the naval base.

That is why "Bobby" George, as he is affectionately known throughout the R. A. F., has been transferred to this base from No. 33 Bomber Squadron of the Home Defence Force.

I was privileged to fly with his squadron when he made the historic first attack on the invading fleet during last autumn's air and naval manoeuvres in the North Sea. I am now able to state that these manoeuvres were mainly staged with the object of testing the value of "power diving" in the event of an attack on a base like Singapore.

In these manoeuvres No. 33 Squadron, on a signal from its leader, dived out of the clouds two miles up in the air on the invading fleet below at a speed of 300 miles an hour.

In the real thing each machine would have dropped 500 lb. bombs.

"Burns" Fat Off Latest Way To Avoid Obesity

CHICAGO, April 25. — Latest test of a new way to get thin—a drug that puts your body under "forced draft" and "burns" the fat off you, making you feel better at the same time—was outlined today by the American College of Physicians.

The drug, one of the chemicals known as "dinitro compounds," can be used to take off any amount of weight desired when used properly, said Dr. Edward L. Bortz of Philadelphia.

He warned at the same time, however, that people who use these drugs without a physician's advice are running grave risk of ill health and perhaps death.

CHICAGO, April 24.—A new life-saving treatment for pneumonia, which works by making the disease temporarily worse and a warning that many dangerous diseases are not cured when they seem to be, were presented today to the American College of Physicians.

The pneumonia treatment, used to cure lobar pneumonia, brings on an artificial crisis about two days ahead of schedule, when the patient is in better condition to meet it, said Dr. Simon S. Leopold, of Philadelphia. In experiments he cut the death rate from 75 to 18 per cent.

The crisis is produced by injecting air into the lung. When compression was maintained in the lung for about forty-eight hours, he explained, the progress of the disease was halted and recovery started.

To make certain that the treatment would benefit human patients Dr. Leopold tried it on thirty-six dogs, which all were infected with lobar pneumonia. Eighteen recovered by the other eighteen did not. Of the eighteen dogs that were treated, fifteen recovered and three died. The treatment had been used successfully in Europe for lobar pneumonia, Dr. Leopold reported. It saved the lives of forty-seven out of fifty patients so treated, who ranged in age from six weeks to sixty-two years.

Finis Illness in Health

Many persons, seemingly healthy, actually were running great risks of serious illness because they were infected with continuous though unsuspected cases of the common cold, broncho-pneumonia, bronchitis, local infections of teeth or tonsils, rheumatic fever or tuberculosis, Dr. Allen K. Kraus reported in a paper on "The Permanent Nature of Various Common Infections."

In many persons, he warned, the diseases were permanent, even though they seemed to have recovered. When a person got another cold, another attack of rheumatic fever after apparently having recovered from an earlier one, it was quite likely that he did not become well, but that the ailment was merely breaking out in serious form after having been dormant in his body since the last outbreak.

There was increasing evidence that the greatest danger of contracting tuberculosis was during infancy and childhood and that most adults who developed the disease had been infected almost all their lives, Dr. Charles Bendize Smith, of New York City, told the college.

"It is probable that most tuberculosis begins in infancy and early childhood. Increasing evidence points toward the view that adult tuberculosis is a recrudescence of a childhood infection rather than re-infection from without," he said. "Infection is usually by family contact or servants. Bovine tuberculosis is rare in this country."

Treats Insanity With Mosquitoes

Saving people from threatened amputation of limbs by a massage treatment, and new progress in preventing insanity by mosquito bites also were reported today.

The massage, used to treat diseased blood vessels in arms and legs has in some cases saved the limbs of persons who otherwise would have had to have them amputated, because it prevented their infection with gangrene, said Dr. Eugene M. Landis, of Philadelphia. The treatment also had been helpful for ulcers, business of the skin and some forms of pain that result from blood vessel disease, Dr. Landis said.

Preventing insanity with mosquito bites that serve as a method of infecting a patient with malaria has had "very satisfactory results," he was reported by Dr. Paul A. O'Leary, of Rochester, Minn.

The mosquito bite may be either a real one from a malaria-infected mosquito or an artificial bite given by the table of malaria germs in a serum made from saliva glands of mosquitoes that have been removed by one of the world's most delicate surgical operations.

The mosquito bite prevention is used for the type of insanity known as general paresis, which is caused by a blood vessel disease of the body.

Malaria has been used successfully for a number of years in treating the paralytic form of insanity, using it for prevention of the disease when its onset is feared is an extension of the practice.

Infection with malaria produces a fever which raises the patient's blood and seems to kill the germs of paresis. The use of it as a preventive works on much the same principle.

Some 3,000 physicians are expected to attend the five-day meeting of the college.

Chi Teh-Ching never saw the man to whom she was legally married. They were betrothed by their parents when they were children and the man died about a month before the day set for the wedding. Parents of the man insisted upon the marriage ceremony being carried out "to soothe the spirit of the dead."

C.N.R. Dining Car Prices to Change

MONTREAL, April 25.—A carte menu will disappear from dining cars of the Continental Limited, Canadian National Railways daily train between Montreal and Vancouver, and also on the Ocean Limited and the Maritime Express between Montreal and Halifax on May 1st, it was stated today by Mr. W. W. Swinden, general superintendent of dining, dining and parlor car service of the Canadian National Railways.

Commencing May 1st, all meals served on these trains will be of the table d'hote variety, complete meals of the "plate service" type popularly preferred to meet present day trends.

There will also be special meals offered at lower prices for children under ten years of age. It is anticipated that the innovation will prove as popular with the travelling public as did the "combination meal" service initiated some time ago on dining and parlor cars. Taking the public into its confidence, the Canadian National is asking passengers on the trains concerned to express their views on this type of service and to offer suggestions. "New menus have been prepared," said Mr. Swinden, which will be allowed on the Continental Limited in each direction and on the Ocean Limited and Maritime Express in each direction on and after May 1st. These provide a choice of "club" breakfast and "plate" luncheons and dinners.

Breakfasts range in price from 35 cents to one dollar, luncheons and dinners from fifty cents to one dollar and twenty-five cents.

Under the new plan, the prices shown on the menu cover the entire meal. "Many patrons, not accustomed to dining car service, have found it difficult in the past to order a satisfactory meal and one which, at the same time, was within the range of their pocket book. The table d'hote system has the advantage of presenting a complete meal to the diner and at the same time stating its all inclusive cost.

Another feature of importance is that it removes much of the uncertainty from dining car operation and reduces overhead costs. Under the "plate meal" system it will not be necessary to carry such varied stocks of food stuffs on the dining cars on the chance that some of these may be ordered a la carte. Dining car crews will also be able to provide more rapid service to their patrons under the new system and each car will be able to serve a larger number of meals than has been possible under the old order of things when many of the meals required individual preparation.

CULTIVATE TASTE FOR MUSIC AND ART

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, April 25.—(C.P.)—An interesting experiment in the popularization of music has been introduced by the National Gallery at Stockholm. Popular concerts are given in the building which houses the art treasures of the country and these concerts, in view of the low entrance charge, attract people from all walks of life.

Dr. A. Gauffin, the Chief Curator of the Gallery, expressed satisfaction with the result obtained. PARENTS HELD FOR DAUGHTERS' DEATH

Coroner's Jury Hold Quebec Couple Criminally Responsible.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

EDMONTON, Alberta, April 24.—Edward Groleau, 49, and his 30-year-old wife stand charged here tonight with the murder of their six-year-old daughter, Laura, who died April 14 last from starvation and ill-treatment.

A jury under Coroner L. Savage, M.D., deliberated five minutes before returning its verdict holding the couple criminally responsible for the child's death. The Coroner thereupon signed the warrant charging Groleau and his wife with the murder. Accused were taken into custody by provincial police and they will be arraigned either tomorrow or Thursday at Valleyfield, Que.

It having been established the child drank coal oil on March 2 last, the coroner first of all poisoning in the case after the child's death on April 14.

Detectives ascertained before today's reopening inquest the only reason the child took coal oil on March 2 was that all other liquids had been refused her.

Identification of a chain with which he said Laura had often been tied was made by Joseph Groleau, brother of the accused. Edward Groleau said he had lived with his brother for some time but left last February when he became disgusted at the cruelties to which his niece was subjected. When he left the house, he testified, his brother had jumped at his throat and had tried to strangle him.

"This mother used to overturn a chair," he continued, "and lay Laura over it. She would beat the child until she had scars all over her body. Laura's cries could be heard as far as the next neighbor's house. I saw Laura beaten with a wire when she was chained and could barely move."

EXPERIENCED Cheesemakers

Cheese making is a specialized trade and men with considerable experience and special training are needed in order to produce high quality cheese consistently. The majority of these, however, had been "making" between 5 and 10 years.
