SAINT JOHN, N.B., Feb. 19 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers defeated Amherst Ramblers 4-2 Saturday night but the Maritime Senior Hockey League fixture—one of two which ended the regular league schedule Saturday—had no effect on the championship race. The issue was decided at Moncton when Halifax St. Mary's edged Moncton Hawks 3-2.

This win clinched the league leadership for Halifax, giving the Nova Scotia club a total of 98 points or two more than Saint John. Playing and winning a postponed game with Amherst Ramblers would raise Beavers to a tie with St. Mary's in points but Halifax would still retain the leadership because of having more wins. Consequently, at a league meeting in Moncton today, Saint John was awarded the postponed game and conceded two points for a tie with Halifax in that column of the standings.

Hawks ended the regular league schedule with 71 points. The other "big four" entries, Amherst, trailed with 21. Last season Beavers finished the regular league play in first place, only to be knocked out by the cellarite St. Mary's.

Beavers will play Hawks and St. Mary's will meet Ramblers in the playoffs. At today's league meeting decision was reached to open the best-of-seven games set for Moncton Thursday, Saint John Saturday and Moncton Feb. 27. Fifth and sixth games, if necessary, will be played March 1 at Saint John and March 2 at Sackville, Amherst or Sussex, as decided by Hawks. The Moncton Stadium will be used for an ice show for a period including March 2.

If the semi-final series goes the limit the seventh game will be played at Saint John March 4.

A meeting of the horsemen will be held tonight at the new Labor Union Hall on Water Street.
