MOVIE CONCERT COLLAPSES

LONDON, Eng., Jan. 30.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Corporation of Barnsley, the mining town in the West Riding of Yorkshire, has quickly repented of its venture into the movie business. After a run of some 10 weeks, in which \$50,000 is estimated to have been lost, the enterprise has been closed down. The Public Hall which was allocated by the Corporation for the enterprise was form-

erly rented to a private concern, but the Town Council with a Socialist majority, decided to exercise their Parliamentary powers and use it for the presentation of films. Though the lowest prices were charged, with special rates to the unemployed, the enterprise was not successful.

The Mayor (Alerman J. F. Broley) in an interview, said that he did not regret that the experiment had been made.
