(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, April 10. - Dominion Livestock - Receipts of livestock on the two markets this morning amounted to 48 cattle, 18 sheep, 730 hogs and 1490 calves. Trading in cattle was slow. A few canners were sold at \$3.00 and \$3.50, and common dairy cows up to \$5.25. Sheep brought \$8.00 to \$9.00 and a couple of spring lambs \$8.00 each. Veal calves were in good demand but there was a wide difference in the prices paid. On one yard from \$7.75 to \$8.75 was the range and on the other yard \$8.50 to \$9.50 was paid for straight lots common and medium calves with a few good veals included. Hogs sold from \$9.75 to \$10.00 flat with the bulk on sale \$10.00. Sows \$8.00 to \$8.50.

and once grown to gardens will be without it because of its good stems and the fine material it gives for cutting. It becomes a favorite market variety almost as soon as introduced. Marigolds want plenty of room to develop and 18 inches for the French and 2 feet for the Africans is none too close. While they like to be close they should not be crowded as when sown so rich they make too heavy a leaf growth and the blossoms are small. Seeding marigolds sown up to a bud at once and then placed to branch out and make good bushes. The seed should not be sown in the open ground until after danger of frost is over, but should be started in flats, or boxes with protection to get early bloom. Many gardeners, however, do content to sow in the open ground. Marigold comes to blossom in short order, one of the quickest of annuals to give results. The tall varieties are best given stakes.

THE BRILLIANT MARIGOLDS

The richest and most velvety mulberry reds and browns as well as crimson and mazarine are found in the marigolds, the color prevailing in the French types, which are either dwarf or tall. The coloring is seldom solid but comes in flakes and spots or with a narrow edging of yellow when it is the prevailing color. For vivid yellows and oranges, the huge double African marigolds are a mainstay. The plummy of the family, a little ferny-leaved plant with finely scented foliage and myriads of tiny brilliant yellow flowers, is known as tagetes signata purpurea. It is an excellent edging plant for the larger types. The tall Africans under good culture will reach a height of four feet. The dwarf French types make round bushes spangly with flowers about 18 inches tall and bloom over a long season. The tall French represented by the popular Josephine strain reach a similar height, but are not as frequently grown as they should be, the dwarf bedding type usurping the affections of gardeners. The tall Josephine, which has the most gorgeous reds of all the marigolds, being particularly brilliant in the fall months, is the finest of this class
