**BRINGING UP FATHER**

**Premier Heckled  
At Joint Meeting**

Portage Electors Enthusiastically  
Applaud Conservative Speak-  
ers And Challenge Several  
Statements Of Attorney Gen-  
eral And Premier Lea.

The joint political meeting held at  
Portage on Monday night was large-  
ly attended, every available seat be-  
ing taken up and even the platform  
space being occupied. Mr. Austin  
Ramsay was appointed chairman—a  
position which he filled to the satis-  
faction of all. On the platform were  
the two candidates, Mr. G. Shelton  
Sharp and Hon. Thane Campbell, al-  
so Premier Lea, Mr. W. H. Dennis,  
Mr. Christopher Metherall, Senator  
McArthur and Mr. Wilfred Tanton.  
In the opening address Mr. Sharp  
stated we are for the present not  
concerned with Federal politics, the  
question today is whether or not the  
electorate is satisfied with the record  
of the present Government. The  
speaker then reviewed the record of  
the Lea and Saunders administra-  
tion. They had run the Province in  
debt to the tune of \$535,000 although  
at the time they were receiving an  
additional revenue—\$125,000 addi-  
tional subsidy and \$40,000 from the  
railway, as well as a greater amount  
of auto and gas taxes. The cost per  
mile of building the roads had been  
greater under Conservative rule be-  
cause in the early days a great deal  
of filling was necessary and the Lib-  
erals now merely skim the surface of  
a road the foundation of which had  
been built by the Conservatives. Out  
of \$125,000 which had been expended  
for road machinery only the amounts  
spent for the large ditchers had been  
wisely expended. The Patrol system  
had been done away with because it  
was a Conservative policy. In Nova  
Scotia and New Brunswick where  
this plan is practiced the condition  
of the roads is much better. Such  
patrol work would give to the men  
of the country needed work instead  
of having two large machines doing  
all the work in the first and second  
districts. Shortly after the Govern-  
ment took office they made a 3 year  
contract to import gravel by rail at  
a cost of \$2.65 per yard while the  
native gravel at Conway, Portage,  
and other places had been allowed  
to go to waste. This gravel is stated  
to contain more sand than imported  
gravel but to be ideal for work on  
roads.  
If some of the money thus spent  
had been expended in the purchase  
of a steam shovel and some motor  
trucks the Island gravel might have  
been used on roads for 40 to 50 miles.

**Liberal Candidate Interrupted**

Hon. Thane Campbell said he con-  
sidered this an opportune time to  
register a protest against the Ben-  
nett Government's action in boost-  
ing the tariff at a special session of  
Parliament called ostensibly to con-  
sider unemployment relief. The road  
policy of the local government was  
commended—in fact the roads had  
been so greatly improved that  
people had forgotten how bad they  
had formerly been. This brought  
from the audience cries of "You  
can't have travelled much on them."  
"What are they like in some places?  
Go to Miminigash." The government  
had fulfilled every pledge that had  
been made to the people. Mr. Camp-  
bell declared. Reference was made to  
the Provincial Police with headquar-  
ters at Charlottetown. (A heckler  
suggested that the Provincial Police  
should have an office in the bush be-  
low Portage or at the Lake).  
Mr. Campbell's appeal for support  
was met by the retort: "We've been  
represented by Summerside lawyers  
long enough." To this Mr. Campbell  
replied: "You lost nothing by that,"  
and the answer came back: "We  
gained nothing."

**Premier Badly Heckled**

Mr. J. D. Kennedy, who was sched-  
uled to speak on behalf of Mr. Sharp  
was unable to be present so that Mr.  
Campbell's supporter, Premier Lea,  
was next called upon to address the  
meeting.

The Premier received a poor hear-  
ing from start to finish. His attempt  
to justify Mr. Campbell's nomination  
by reference to the similarity of the  
position occupied by Mr. A. F. Arsenault  
brought from many the state-  
ment that Mr. Arsenault was born  
in the District he represents. The  
Premier's statement that no prohibi-  
tion of voters were let out of jail was  
answered by the statement: "They  
were never put in!" "Tell us about  
education," "Holstein cattle," and  
similar remarks punctuated his ad-  
dress. The people had been satisfied  
with the appointment of one magis-  
trate and others had not been ap-  
pointed, he continued. Interruptions  
continued and the Premier heatedly  
fused to take the advice of a lawyer

and he might have his turn later.  
The Chairman urged that Mr. Lea  
be given a hearing but it was im-  
possible to restore order and until  
the close of his address the Premier  
was continuously heckled.

**Mr. Tanton's Speech**

Mr. Tanton arrived at the hall be-  
fore the close of Mr. Lea's speech and  
he was invited to substitute for Mr.  
Kennedy. He discussed the various  
issues in his usual common-sense  
fashion. It had been stated that  
Premier Lea is a farmer—he may be  
so professionally, but he is also a  
Grit Politician. The Prohibition  
question had been dragged by the  
Liberals even into the church. They  
had dragged politics into religion in-  
stead of trying to get a little religion  
into their politics. Premier Lea is  
trying to concentrate the various de-  
partments of the government into  
one—and he is to head it. He has re-  
fused to take the advice of a lawyer

of thirty years standing. Is he more  
likely to listen to advice from a  
young man like our present attor-  
ney-general?

In his rebuttal speech Mr. Sharp  
stated that Hon. Thane Campbell  
had said that the amount paid into  
the Prohibition Commission during  
the last year of Conservative rule  
was \$80,000. According to the public  
accounts the amount was \$57,000. In  
reference to the subsidy the Liberal  
administration had made several un-  
successful trips to Ottawa to get this  
claim settled. But although these  
Liberals had been unable to obtain  
anything from the Dominion Gov-  
ernment with whom they were in  
line, three former Premiers from the  
western provinces had their claims  
satisfactorily settled. "Let us send  
after it the man who prepared the  
brief, which secured for us the \$125-  
000 increase—Hon. J. D. Stewart!  
Then we will secure a settlement and  
the quicker we do it the better." (Ap-

plause). A local man enquired of the  
Premier why they preached economy  
and yet allowed the road machine to  
be used in throwing into the wood  
and gutters the clay which had been  
placed on the highway at consider-  
able cost by men with horses and  
carts.

Another local man spoke in sup-  
port of Liberal policies.

Premier Lea also had five minutes  
for rebuttal.

After a vote of thanks to the  
chairman the meeting closed by sing-  
ing "God Save the King."
