Big Crowds In Attendance - Gloria Wins Free For All, Breaking the Track Record-Daisy Wilkes First in the Two Fifteen-Wind Cheked the Racers.

Sussex, Sept. 12 - (Special) - The attendance at the exhibition today was very large. The big crowds, were of course attracted by the horse races, which were exceptionally good. TRADES LABOR CONGRESS MEETING IN SAINT JOHN

Sixty Delegates Welcomed by Mayor Sears-President Says Executive is Opposed to Fitzpatrick Sunday Law Many Members Added During the Year-Variou Recommendations Including Organizers For Each Province.

St. John, Sept. 12.-(Special)-The Trades and Labor Congress of Canada opened here this morning. Upwards of sixty delegates were present. Mayor Sears welcomed the visiting delegates to the city. President Mee in the course of his speech said the executive was opposed to the enactment of the so-called Fitzpatrick Sunday law. He recommended that the constitution be amended to create the office of provincial organizer, this office to be held by the Vice-President of each Province. He also referred to the necessity of forming a permanent organizing fund and pointed out the necessity of appointing a permanent legislative committee whose duty shall be to bring to the attention of government such matters as are of interest to the working men and women of Canada.

THE METHODIST GEN. CONFERENCE

Opened Yesterday in Montreal, Venerable Dr. Carman Presiding-How Conference is Composed-Church Union to Come Up-New Editor For The Wesleyan, &c.

Montreal, Sept. 12.-(Special)-The General Conference of the Methodist Church in Canada opened its Seventh Session in St. James Church this morning at 10 o'clock, Rev. Dr. Carman presiding. The General Conference is the supreme governing body in the church and consists of three hundred and six ministerial and lay representatives, which is in the proportion of one to every ten members to the annual conferences. The General Conference meets once in four years. Dr. Carman, although 75 years old, is a capable presiding officer and since the middle of last April has travelled 25,000 miles in connection with church work. He remains in office another four years, being elected four years ago for 8 years.

GERMANS SPY ON BRITISH COAST

London, Sept. 12--According to a correspondent at Hamburg of the Daily Mail during the German naval manoeuvres on the night of Sept. 10, thirty-six torpedo boat destroyers accomplished the sensational feat of dashing for and reaching the British coast returning without being detected. The nominal purpose of the raid across the North Sea was to carry out the search for the German fleet which however the torpedo boat officers knew was lying off Heligoland.

MANY HARVESTERS KILLED IN TRAIN

Eleven Were Killed, Twenty-Five Hurt Seriously, All From Ontario.

Montreal, Sept. 12.-A C. P. R. harvest train at Asilda, the first station west of Sudbury, was run into by the east bound Winnipeg express at 1 a.m. today. Ten were killed and many injured. It is not known yet whether it was the harvest train from Montreal or Toronto. The engineer of the express says that the airbrake had been tampered with and the air allowed to escape so that he could not stop as he was running into the station. The stop-cook had been opened.
