THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.

The election campaign in the British
Isles is now in full swing. We in Canada
have become accustomed to simultaneous
polling and to having the result deter-
mined in one day. In the United King-
dom the polling, which will begin Septem-
ber 29, will be spread over two weeks. The
last general election there was held in
July 1895, when in a house of 670 the
Liberal Unionists numbered 411, the
Nationalists 70 and the Parliamtes 12. But
the tendency of the by-elections has been
somewhat against the Administration so
that its majority is not so large as it was
five years ago. This is the reverse of
what has occurred in Canada, where the
by-elections have mainly resulted in favor
of the Government. None the less the
impression prevails that the Ministry
will be sustained, and probably with a
very large support. We notice that I. N.
Ford's cable letter states that the only
question is as to the size of the majority,
which will probably be as great as that of
1895.

The South Africa war will no doubt be a
main factor in the contest. The Liberal
contention at the outset was that the war
might have been avoided. Their leaders
have severely arraigned the Government
for the disasters, the large expenditure of
lives and money involved in the struggle.
But the country apparently believes that
the war was inevitable and unavoidable
and that the only thing the government
could do was to conquer and annex the
pugnacious Dutch Republics as has been
done. With Kruger gone out of the coun-
try, Steyn and Botha in hiding, the fine
Boer army reduced to a few scattered
guerrilla bands who have destroyed their
artillery, the end of the war is evidently
close at hand. At this juncture the Min-
isters place before the country as the
main issue the question whether or not
South Africa ought to remain British. The
answer may be confidently anticipated,
for upon this point the Liberal party is
divided.

It seems to be taken for granted that a
somewhat sweeping reconstruction will
follow the election and that some promi-
nent members of the Liberal Unionist com-
bine will be retired. Among those singled
out for decapitation is the War Minister,
Lord Lansdowne, some time Governor
General of Canada. He will be made a
sort of scape-goat for the disasters and re-
buffs which the war, brought about, while
the Government will take credit for the
general result. We need hardly speculate
upon the improbable event of a Liberal
victory in Great Britain at the coming
election. But even should it occur, it is

CRONJE'S NIECES AS SRIES.

Lieut. Morrison Writes to Friends
About Some Interesting Visitors.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—Lieut. E. W. Morri-
son of the Royal Canadian Artillery in
South Africa, in a letter to a friend says:
"We had visits in camp several times
from the Misses Cronje, nieces of the gen-
eral. They are very nice, well-educated
girls and quite fashionably dressed. As
we marched into camp last Sunday we
passed them on the veldt driving home
from church in a stylish Victoria with a
fine pair of carriage horses and a little
Zulu boy on the box. It looked curiously
out of place on the veldt and reminded me
of the southern outfits before 'de wah.'
When the Misses Cronje visited our
camp they were attended by three strap-
pling Zulu waiting maids, their freshly
oiled faces shining out of enormous snow-
white sun bonnets. Cronje pere and the
girls' two brothers are away fighting
against us. I may be a Foxy Quiller, but
I am inclined to think that the social at-
tentions of the young ladies are not prompt-
ed so much by a desire for the pleasure of
our society as a patriotic impulse to assist
the Boer cause by obtaining a knowledge
of our position."
