FROM Cherry Valley a correspondent writes:—Oyster and hauling is the order of the day here at present. The death of Joseph Vessey, one of the oldest and most respected citizens of this place, is greatly regretted. The deceased was 80 years of age and endowed with many of the qualities which go to make up a man of worth. Hayden Crane has secured the contract of supplying the Cherry Valley Butter Factory with wood for the ensuing season. The Cherry Valley Dairying Society which has flourished here for the past few months, has discontinued its meetings until next season if the young men take up the work next year with the same zeal they have shown during the past winter there need be no fear for the future of this promising society.

On Sunday morning the twenty-fourth ult. at Strathcona, Kings Co., death claimed for its victim Alexander McDonald at the advanced age of seventy-eight years. The deceased was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland, in the year eighteen hundred and twenty eight. At the age of twelve years he with his parents, and the rest of their family came to the Island in the ship, Washington, and landed at Pinette, where they lived for a short time. From there they removed to what is known as the big Lot near Forest Hill, Kings Co., where they made their home. When the deceased came to manhood he took up the first farm that was taken up on Forest Hill, and made the first clearance that was made in that settlement, where he resided for upwards of thirty years. He then removed to the adjoining settlement of Strathcona where he lived the rest of his days.

The deceased was a man of noble character, he was upright and honest in his dealing with his fellow men, hospitable to his neighbors, kind to his neighbors and friendly to every one, and respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was a consistent member of the Dundas Presbyterian Church. The deceased had been in failing health for some years, but not considered serious until within a few days of his death when he was stricken with paralysis which proved fatal. He leaves to mourn an aged widow, with whom he had lived for fifty six years, also five daughters and three sons. The daughters are Mrs. Charles Webster of Marle; Mrs. John Ross and Mrs. Rob. Hawbolt of Morrell; Mrs. J. B. O'Neil of Forest Hill; and Mrs. Geo. J. O'Neil of Dundas. The sons are Murdoch, and J. David at home, and Peter in California, also one brother Angus of Forest Hill and one sister Mrs. Wm. Ward of Upton. The late Mrs. Albert McEwen of St. Peter's Harbor, was also a daughter. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. M. N. McLeod of Dundas, and the interment took place at the Dundas cemetery.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries authorized the free transportation from Pictou to Cape Traverse of thirty-three of the Minto's passengers who are without funds. They left Pictou Wednesday at 3 p. m. in charge of Benjamin Rogers and A. E. Ings.

The Guardian has been informed that the last will of the late Mrs. Allan Newson, of Cornwall has been presented to the Judge of the Probate Court. The deceased bequeathed most of her property to her son Allan. The will was allowed to go on record, and the executor, Allan Newson was granted probate.

D. M. McDONALD of Springton, yesterday brought into the city a fine stick of timber. It is a black spruce, sixty-six feet long, and was disposed of to M. P. Hogan for a handsome sum. The tree before being cut was seventy-nine feet long, and nine inches in diameter at the small end. At the butt it measured thirty-two inches in diameter and was very even in size up to thirty feet from the ground, where the diameter was two feet. This stick will be used for a mast and is a survivor of the splendid monarchs of the forest once so common in this Island, but now, alas, almost numbered with many of the recollections of the good old days. The age of the tree, which was arrived at by counting the rings depicting the annual growth, showed that it had flourished for 143 years.

For some time past the Angel of Death has been strenuously at work in Darnley, and on Feb. 19th another victim was claimed in the person of James Brennan. About a year ago his health was somewhat affected by his continued watching and care of his wife, who had been sick for some considerable time, and who died about the first of Feb. Scarcely more than two months after his youngest and favorite son, Hubert, was taken ill, and in a short time followed his mother to the grave. During his illness Mr. Brennan was constantly watched and tended by the child, it being scarcely any rest, whatever, and when death came he was scarcely comatose. To add to his distress, sleep refused to come as a solace to his already much exhausted system nor could he resist any food. All that could be done failed to have the desired effect. Though of strong constitution the prolonged loss of rest worked disastrously on his nerves, and consequently affected his mind so that he became rather melancholy. His family and relatives under the treatment of Dr. Goodwill in Charlottetown, but of no avail. He gradually sank from exhaustion, until Feb. 19th death came as a relief. His remains were borne to Kensington by train, thence home to Darnley and on Thursday Feb. 21st, were interred in St. Mary's Cemetery, Indian River, the funeral services being conducted by Rev. Mar Gillis. In Mr. Brennan is lost a most devoted father, a man very highly respected in the community and by all who had the pleasure of knowing him. He leaves to mourn three sons, Louis and John at home and Leo in Boston; five daughters Mrs. Alfred Morrison, Darnley, and four at home; also two brothers John, of Darnley and Michael, Long River, and four sisters. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family in their great loss.
