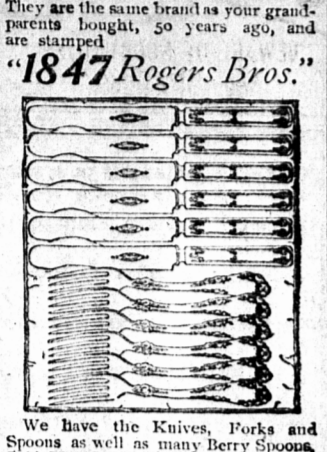

LATE visitors to the P. E. I. Stock Farm say that the cattle are in excellent condition showing evidence of care and good treatment. There is an exceptionally fine lot of Ayrshire cows in milk, a careful record being kept of the milk produced by each. The barns, stables and stock are scrupulously clean, a splendid object lesson for visiting farmers.

EASTER comes rather late this year and the prospects are that Easter lilies will be scarce, at least that is what the local florists say and to back it up are advising their customers to place their orders early. They are not doing this to increase business, but so that their regular customers will not be disappointed. Carnations then will be in abundance although the price will remain probably as at present, seventy-five cents per dozen. -St. John Sun.

THE Dawson team is now in Winnipeg on its way home. The team is still under the management of Joe Doyle and has toured Canada right to the Atlantic coast, playing twenty-two games, of which thirteen were wins for the visitors and nine losses. Welly Young will not return to the far north with the team. He is not playing with it now, having decided to remain in his native town of Ottawa, where he has accepted a position with the Railway Accident Insurance Company. The team is now in splendid form and is putting up a fine article of hockey.

THE current issue of the Maritime Merchant is one that should interest all engaged in the mercantile business and especially those in this province. All the departments are as usual replete with valuable information regarding various lines of trade and industry in which the people of these provinces are concerned. The "Merchant" is a paper which steadfastly endeavors to live up to the motto it has set for itself, namely, a better effort every time. It is a fortnightly paper of one hundred pages and sells at the nominal price of one dollar a year, and its readers are unanimous in the opinion that it is a good dollar's worth.

The attention of Guardian readers is drawn to the 50th annual statement of the Canada Life Assurance Company which appears in this issue. This Company has entered on a new era, having within the last year passed the \$100,000,000 mark and while showing evidence of vigorous growth its strength increases with its years. The financial statement shows that the reserve funds are greater than the Canadian Government requirement by \$3,000,000 and as far as is known no Company on this continent holds such a strong reserve. The report shows that the new business paid for and increase in assets were both in advance of any previous year's record. The total assets are now over \$20,000,000. A striking statement is that the Canada Life has since its inception paid or credited policy holders over \$7,000,000 more than they have paid in. This is a practical evidence of sound and conservative management. The increase in surplus of considerably over half a million dollars during the year, will be a creditable reading for the policy holders as also will be the following extract from the President's address: "This surplus will enable us to pay cash profits to policy holders substantially larger than were paid five years ago" W. The Sydney Post has the following in its North Sydney correspondence. It is understood that Thomas McLean of this town, will bring action against the Bank of Nova Scotia and E. J. Mabon, the local manager, for damages for alleged defamation of character. It is said that a Halifax firm had made a draft on the business here with which Mr. McLellan is connected, which was due on the 7th inst. and that Mr. McLellan's daughter, Belle, on the 6th, went to the bank to deposit the amount of the draft, and it is alleged was told that the draft was invalid, but that payment would be accepted later. In the meantime it is charged that Mr. Mabon, the manager of the local branch, had returned the draft to the head office with the following memo attached: "With reference to your D. 1130 please inform your clients that we do not think it advisable for them to have anything to do with the name of McLellan. Tom has turned the business over to his daughter Belle, so as to evade his creditors and, as he is her advisor they are sure in the end to suffer." Signed M." The draft with the memo was returned to the bank, who immediately forwarded it to their Cape Breton representative, John A. McKay, with instructions to look into the matter. McKay at once came to North Sydney, collected the amount and gave in exchange the draft with the memo attached. It is understood that legal advice has been sought, and that action for damages for a heavy amount will be brought against the bank and Mr. Mabon." Mr. Mabon belongs to Charlottetown.

The dairying industry in P. E. Island was started by the Federal Government in the year 1891. The New Perth factory was in operation that year under the management of J. T. Dillon. During the next two or three years other factories were started in different parts of the province under the supervision of Professor Robertson, Dairy Commissioner, with J. T. Dillon as manager for the Island. The number of factories has increased until we have now fifty-two on the list and the largest part of the milk produced is now manufactured in them. But it is to be feared that the business is not conducted in a way to give the best results. A large number of the patrons depend only on the grass season to supply milk to the factories, and their cows are very much neglected during the winter season and are not then bringing in any returns and are not in condition when spring comes to give such results as if fed well and kept giving a good supply of milk during the winter. In order to encourage and stimulate people to pay more attention to winter dairying, the P. E. Island Dairy Association purposed to give prizes to the patrons who would supply the largest quantity of milk per acre under cultivation—milk to test at least 35 per cent. of butter fat. The Dairy Association wished the prizes to be for the whole year, but the department of Agriculture insisted on dividing the prizes between summer and winter work. The business has not been as successful during the last three years as it has been previously. Dry seasons shortened the supply of milk and our farmers have neglected to have green crops to supplement the pastures. Another reason of the decrease of our dairy products is that, pork being higher than usual farmers have been paying more attention to that industry. The object of the Dairy Association in offering prizes is to see what can be done by keeping the cows in good condition for producing milk all the year round. -Maritime Farmer.

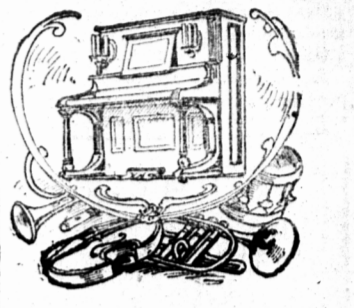
