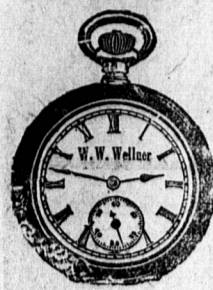

At the third quarterly meeting of Wesley Memorial Methodist church, Rev. J. B. Champion of Prince Edward Island was unanimously invited to remain on the Harcourt, N. B. circuit another year.

In the senate several days ago Hon. Mr. Scott informed Hon. Mr. Ferguson that on January 24th, the secretary of agriculture for Prince Edward Island, submitted to the live stock commissioner the names of certain farmers from whom ten were to be selected to take a course at Truro. Owing to the want of persons knowledge the live stock commissioner asked the provincial authorities to make the selection. The selection has not yet been made.

At the National Council here in June the questions discussed will include the proper inspection of food with a view to securing hygienic purity in all manufactured articles of diet; the question of the indeterminate sentence, on lines similar to those being considered by the government parole officer, the resolution recommending that prisoners be treated as patients suffering from moral disease; the registration of nurses, after a similar system to that which obtains in Montreal, and other questions.

The programme for the races during the exhibition, September 14 to 21, has been completed, and Ald. J. A. Johnson, the speed superintendent, has again arranged for six days' racing, which ensures a great meet, equal, if not surpassing those of recent years. There will be six days' racing, two races each day, each for a purse of \$400 a total of \$4,800. Six of the purses have been guaranteed by the Halifax Hotel, King Edward Hotel, Royal Hotel, Merchants and Manufacturers, Halifax Breweries and the Halifax Tramway. There is only one change in this programme from last year, the 2.15 class being substituted for the free-for-all. This promises to be a popular class, as it will give an opportunity to horses which are now not eligible for the 2.19 class and those which may get faster records early in the season. Halifax Ex.

SECRETARY LAMY, of the Amherst Hockey Club, has communicated with J. C. Lithgow, M. P. A. A. A., asking that body to communicate with the trustees of the Stanley Cup, asking that the Maritime Provinces be at least recognized in regard to the games for the championship trophy. As Secretary Lamy truly says, if the Amherst club is not recognized there is small likelihood of any other team being considered, as never can a club have better claims than they have this season, in winning the championship of Nova Scotia, defeating the champions of New Brunswick and P. E. Island, and also a team which had but a few days previous played for this very same Stanley cup. Secretary Lithgow will have the matter placed before the M. P. A. A. A., which body will no doubt accede to Secretary Lamy's request, which they certainly should, as there has been too much of this non consideration of the Maritime Provinces by those in the Upper Provinces as regards sport, and it is about time the latter recognize that we deserve as much consideration as some others.

F. E. H. LUKER, representing the Canada Cycle & Motor Co. Ltd., Toronto, is in the city and leaves tonight on return to the mainland. Mr. Luke reports that the bicycle business this season promises to be much better this year than it has been for the past three years.

ABOUT 12 tons of Government hay arrived at York Station Friday morning and in about an hour it was distributed to 45 farmers at the rate of three, two and at last one bundle each, quite a number being compelled to go home without any. Covehead West, Covehead, Stanhope, Union Road, Fristan Road, Pleasant Grove, Marshfield, Suffolk and York obtain their hay at York station.

Rev. H. H. Colpitts, who has been officiating at Main street Baptist church since the death of Mr. Toach, has accepted a call to Yarmouth, and will leave for that city to assume charge of the church about the end of the present month. The first Sunday in May Rev. David Hutchinson will preach his first sermon in Main street church, as pastor. Rev. Dr. Gordon was for a while in charge of the church to which Mr. Colpitts is going to.—St. John Telegraph.

At the regular meeting of Union Division, S. O. T. held on April 15, it was resolved and carried unanimously by a standing vote, that the officers and members of that Division show their approval to the amendments relative to 'The Prohibition Act' proposed at the last meeting of the Grand Division. An appointed committee drew up the following resolution:—Be it resolved that we, the officers and members of Union Division No 45, S. O. T. desire to record our approval to the proposed amendments as set forth at the last session of the Grand Division to strengthen the Prohibition Act; and that our local representatives, earnestly and faithfully exercise all just means and influence at their command to have such amendments passed by the House. The agitation for a tunnel to connect Prince Edward Island with the mainland has assumed definite form and in the course of a decade or more the great work may be an accomplished fact. The people of the Island for once in their lives, seem to be united in asking for the construction of a tunnel, which will probably cost upwards of ten million dollars. This seems to be a very large sum but we do not see that there is any other solution of the difficulty. Ice-breakers and ice boats have proved very unsatisfactory, a bridge is impracticable and if regular communication is to be maintained at all during the winter months it would seem that a tunnel would have to be built. Prince Edward Island in summer is a very delightful province but its isolation in winter is a great drawback. Under the terms of confederation there is to be continuous steam communication between the Island and the mainland and the delegates who visited Ottawa on Friday, claim that the only way to solve the problem is for the Dominion Government to construct a tunnel. We trust that the Dominion Government will decide to meet the wishes of the people in this matter and that the work will be begun as soon as possible.—Sackville Tribune.

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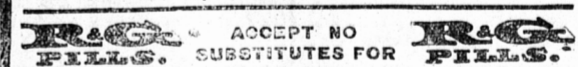
