The Halifax Herald of March 7th says: Mr. Hensley, father of the late Captain Hensley, received to-day a copy of the London Telegraph containing a letter from Bennett Burleigh, the paper's correspondent in South Africa. Referring to the engagement in which the late Captain Hensley lost his life, Mr. Burleigh writes:—"The Boers contested every inch of ground and rock cover, but gradually were forced back again and again. There were wild Irish rushes and cheers, and bit by bit the position was improved, and the advanced parties linked together. Once more the Second Dublin Fusiliers got into the thick of the battle, and as a consequence suffered rather severely. Faultlessly brave Captain Hensley, with whom I have been often in the armored train and field, was killed outright, shot in the head. Another officer or two of his regiment were injured, and a number of casualties occurred amongst the non-commissioned officers and men. Oh the battlefield that day many kind friends and gallant men found resting places among the silent ones, but yet not to utter silence, for their lives remain eloquent. Let us turn away from these new made graves, where there were no firing parties, but only wet weary eyes for Hensley, the Dublin "boys" and many more, as there were also for the late Major Childie; and Father Matthew gave such comfort to mourners."

Prof. Robertson will visit Truro within a few weeks and will meet with the School Board, the Town Council and representatives of the Board of Trade. In addition to the establishment of the Sloyd School for boys from 11 to 14 years of age, a class for student teachers attending the Normal School will be provided for, and it is also expected that a class will be maintained on Saturdays for the instruction of teachers of the public schools. It is also proposed that during the summer vacation teachers from the other schools of the province may have an opportunity of acquiring instruction in the Sloyd method and system. An additional feature will be the selection of one teacher student from within the province who will be sent upon a three months' trip to England, Germany and Sweden this coming summer to make a thorough study of the Sloyd Systems in operation in those countries. Sir William McDonald will provide for all expenses in establishing and for maintaining the school for a period of three years, at the end of which time it is expected that the Town of Truro will take over the school and maintain it in the future. All other expenses for the purposes named above in addition to establishing the school will also be borne by Sir William. The Governor-General and Lady Minto will in all probability come to Truro to open the school. Their Excellencies are taking a deep interest in Sir William McDonald's philanthropic projects and have given every possible encouragement to Prof. Robertson and all others who have aided in bringing about the acceptance of Sir William's generous offer.
