This largest number of passengers to leave P. E. Island at one time, the largest passenger list on record of any boat from our shores, and the largest emigration or excursion party in the history of the Province boarded the S. S. Northumberland on Saturday forenoon for the North West. Summerside alone contributed over twenty. Trains from east and west brought hundreds, making the grand total of five hundred and sixty bound for the harvest fields. There were besides these a Raymond excursion party, and many other passengers which filled the steamer so that accommodation was out of the question.

The arrival of the Princess at the Pier some fifteen minutes before the announced time delayed the reception to the returning firemen on Saturday evening, the steamer being at her berth a few minutes before the arrival of the torch lights on the wharf. Rousing cheers announced that the men were landing and as they came down the gangway the 4th Reg. Band struck up "Home Sweet Home" and they are "Jolly Good Fellows." Only a moment or two elapsed and the procession moved up the wharf, the crowds cheering. As the procession passed along Queen Street citizens showed their appreciation by making displays of fire works. At the City Hall addresses of welcome were delivered by Coun. Brown, the Sijpdiary Magistrate and Coun. Brown, welcoming the boys and congratulating them upon the manner in which they had sustained the reputation enjoyed for many years. Chief Hermans replied in his usual good manner and said the boys had done what they could, and regretted that the judges did not see fit to award the Charlottetown team the prize in the hose reel race. The boys feel in excellent spirits and think that it would be unfair to expect to bring all the prizes to the city.
