UNIQUE BOOK-MARK

Major W. B. Stevens, officer in charge of the Salvation Army here, is in receipt of a unique book mark—part of the balloon Explorer II which in the service of science attained a world's altitude record of 72,395 feet, about 13 miles above sea level, on November 11, 1935. It will be recalled that the Explorer II was under the command of Capt. Albert W. Stevens, U.S.A., commander and scientific observer. After the flight it was considered the balloon was unsafe for further service, and it was broken up, the silk covering being manufactured for book marks and distributed among members by the National Geographical Society.

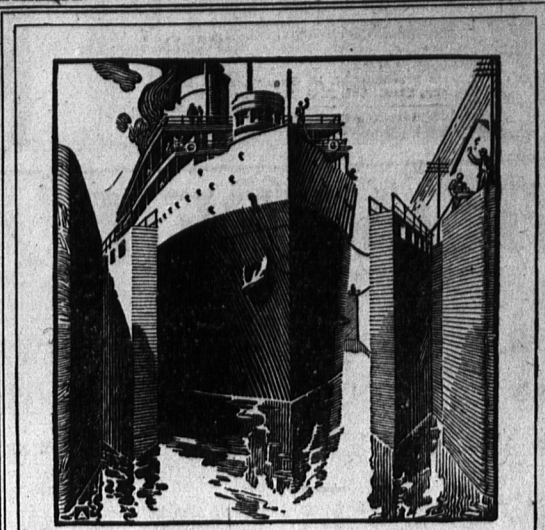
Mr. Peter Clary, Boughton Island, is visiting friends at Red Point the guest of Mr. James Allen.

NEW YORK, March 10—News from Europe this morning shows improvement and the probability is that France will continue to demand that Germany live up to existing treaties, while other powers will probably be less aggressive in their demands. It seems that there will be a great deal of negotiating and talking about the Locarno Treaty with threats, etc., just as there was about oil sanctions which were threatened against Italy. Nevertheless, the uncertainty of the situation will no doubt cause a great deal of confusion of thought, especially as to the proper course to follow in stock market. Based on yesterday's action we would look for lower levels today and would look on for a few days.

Currencies

(Canadian Press) **NEW YORK, March 10**—The foreign exchange markets recovered today from the severe case of jitters that developed when Germany occupied the Rhineland on Saturday.

The Canadian dollar remained stationary throughout the day at par unchanged from yesterday. The French franc moved up .01 1/4 of a cent to a closing rate of 6.65 3/4 cents while the pound sterling, finishing the day at \$4.98 1/2, showed a gain of 3-8 of a cent.

MONTREAL, March 10—Leading currencies moved into higher territory on Montreal foreign exchange today. The United States dollar added 1-32 of one per cent to 1-32 premium while the pound sterling was up 17-32 cent at \$4.98 23-32. The French franc at 6.65 15-16 cents was ahead a minor fraction.

TORONTO, March 10—The bulls had the better of the argument today on the Toronto mining market, all groups showing moderate gains representing only a small portion of the losses suffered in Monday's war scare sell-off. The golds recorded a sizeable rebound but the edge was taken off the rally by quite heavy losses in the senior gold group. Dome noted a loss of 1 1-2 and Lake Shore was down a fraction.

Base metals displayed a firmer tone. Noranda closed a fraction up at the day's higher and Sudbury Basin, Falconbridge and Ventures closed with gains of 10 to 15 cents each.

Narrow gains appeared for Eldorado and Castle in the silvers. Gains predominated in the oils. Volume was off to 852,000 shares, the smallest for a full session since Jan. 21.

Trading price for calves was \$5 to \$8, a lot of about 25 cents. Bulk of veals were sold in mixed lots at \$7 to \$7.75.

Few and wanted hogs brought \$9 with select drawing the usual 1/2 premium. Butchers, heavies and lights were \$8.50 and extra heavies \$8. Sows sold between \$7.25 and \$8.

MANCHOUKUAN TROOPS CAPTURE CHINESE CITY

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SHANGHAI, March 10.—Chinese press reports said today a small detachment of Manchoukuan troops had seized Pailingniao, the capital of Chinese Inner Mongolia, extending Japan's sphere of influence between Soviet Russia and China proper 200 miles farther westward.

The Manchoukuan were said to be commanded by Gen. Li Shohsin and were reported to have come in motor trucks from Changpei, in Northern Chahar Province of China.
