Describes Exciting Trip of "Shediac"

(One of the ships protecting convoys going to Gibraltar is the Canadian Corvette Shediac. The naval correspondent of the London Daily Herald, A. J. McWhinnie, spent two weeks aboard the Shediac and wrote the following story for the BBC, telling, among other things, the tale of the U-boat which he believed destroyed a U-boat.

LONDON, March 18 - (CP) - We had fights with long-range German bombers, which showed us for three days, and bombed us twice. We picked up survivors in an open boat from a torpedoed freighter. We found another cargo ship out of control, her men still on board, and preventing the sinking. We shot for two nights and a day, we saved the United Nations a big cargo of ammunition. We fought a U-boat, and our gunners were fighting bombers overhead. We had so many subsequent fights with U-boats that we ran short of depth charges. We had to locate and destroy them. N.S. House Tables Destroyer Report HALIFAX, March 16 - (CP) - British firms apparently were "not agreeable or willing" to furnish manufacturing data for auxiliary machinery on two destroyers under construction at Halifax, according to a report tabled today in the Nova Scotia Legislature. S. J. Montgomery, Director of Industrial Production for the province, stated in the Industry Department's report that difficulties were encountered when efforts were made to have certain smaller auxiliary machinery and equipment for the destroyer turned out in Nova Scotia shops. "It was found," his report said, "that the detailed blueprints necessary for the construction of the various equipment were not available from Great Britain, and that, apparently, the British manufacturers of such equipment were not agreeable or willing to supply such blueprints and information."

Money-Makers Are Kept Busy OTTAWA, March 19 - (CP) - Canada's official money-makers worked overtime during 1942 to keep pace with the demand for coins, it was shown in the annual report of the Royal Canadian Mint, tabled in the House of Commons today. The Mint operated throughout the year from 16 to 24 hours per day and it was necessary to increase the staff of mint craftsmen. A total of 108,186,000 pieces were issued during 1942, an increase of 23,280,000 pieces over 1941. The mint coined 2,587,973 pieces for the government of Newfoundland. The increase in production was general over all the different sizes of coins.

Vincent Massey, Canada's High Commissioner to England, was chairman. Dr. Weeks who graduated from Mount Allison University in 1933 with his B.A. and traveled to England on a Rhodes Scholarship, spoke on "Europe Under Hitler". The lecture was followed by a question and answer period. The Germans are certainly emphasizing the seriousness of their position. Naval War Exhibition Opens At Halifax HALIFAX, March 22 - (CP) - Navy-conscious Halifaxians took the opportunity today to examine for the first time some of the intricate parts of the fighting ships they see almost daily as the Canadian naval war exhibition opened here during its cross-Canada tour. Rear Admiral L. W. Murray, senior officer commanding the Atlantic coast, and Lieutenant-Governor H. E. Kendall of Nova Scotia formally opened the exhibition, which is slated to remain here a week before moving back to Ottawa. R. A. Major, president of the Nova Scotia Maritime Division of the Navy League of Canada, which is sponsoring the exhibition here, introduced Admiral Murray and Lieutenant Gov. Kendall. According to third officer Marlon Brewster, W.R.C.N.S. of Toronto, in charge of the exhibition, the displays of processed concentrated foods for emergency use at sea attracted considerable attention from the women visitors.
