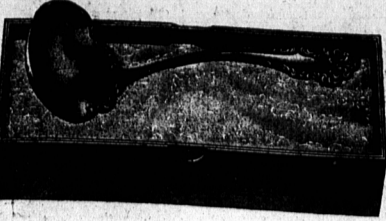

LeLachour vs Manual, action for damages for loss of a horse alleged to be occasioned by the defendant negligently driving on a public road causing loss of plaintiff's horse. Judgment reserved. Stewart, K. C. for plaintiff; J. D. Stewart and McDonald for defendant. The last case on the docket was a case of Turner vs Turner. Action of trespass now being tried before the Chief Justice occupied all day yesterday and is not yet completed. Mr. Gaudet for plaintiff opened the case and the plaintiff's case was about completed when the court adjourned. The question involved is the title to fifty acres of land on Lot 55. Gaudet and Johnson for plaintiff; Stewart, K. C. and Inman for defendant.

L. Vickerson of the P. E. I. R and five men crossed to Pictou yesterday to bring over some machinery for the railway.

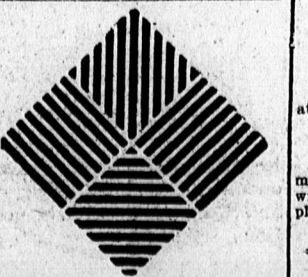

Test for Astigmatism
