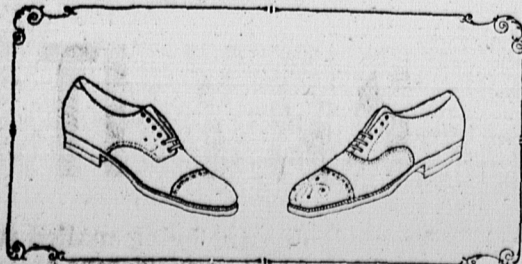

He makes to his electors and still be considered an upright and honorable man if he pays his bills and keeps his word in the transaction of private business. But which is really worse to break one's word to one other who trusts him, or to a thousand others who trust him?

Women have very strong reasons for requiring that men shall keep faith with them in all the relations of life. As husbands, lovers, medical, legal or banking advisers they require men that they can trust and upon whose truthfulness and honor they can rely. Not less do they need such men to represent them in the legislature and the government that make and administer the laws of the land. That is why we look forward hopefully to the prospect that the electorate of women in his island may powerfully aid in unifying our political life and in restoring thereto the virtue of truth-telling and promise-keeping which prevailed in the earlier and better days of our island history. The time has come as we believe a "ring out the false ring in me" in our public life. This is a bigger business than mere party politics, and as we sincerely believe it is the greatest duty of the hour.

If a personal word may be permitted, the writer of these Notes, for many years a Liberal. That was in the earlier and, as we believe, the better days of Liberalism. Be that as it may, promise-breaking and deception have no proper place in the platform of any political party. We believe that he men now in power have broken faith with the people who trusted them and had faith in them and elected them four years ago. Our solemn conviction is that they broke faith with the people in their taxation policy, in their road building, in their salary-grabbing, in their poll taxing, in their pledges to look after our Ottawa claims, in their promise of a spur line to the mud deposits in Richmond Bay, in their promises of economy, in their reckless expenditure of the taxpayers' money and in many other ways. And in cases where they have "kept the promise to the car they broke it to the horse".

Men in public life are looked to as an example to those around them. What would be the condition of society of business and commercial life, of professional and industrial life in Prince Edward Island if the base example of deception and promise-breaking set by the men in power, should be followed and adopted by our people generally? Surely if the votes of women can have any uplifting duties and responsible and purifying effect in political at high hopes.

ABOUT FIVE YEARS AGO REV. WILLIAM J. Finn who had won fame on the Pacific coast for the tenor of the choirs which he had trained, was called to New York to take charge of the Paulist Choir School. 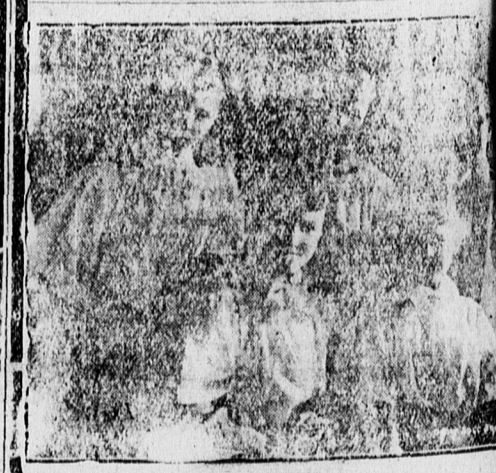
