

Jr. Board Of Trade Elects New Slate

Mr. Arthur Clark was elected President of the Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade at the annual meeting of the organization last night.

The following is the President's address read by Mr. J. W. MacKenzie: The activities of the Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade for the year ending September 1940 have made it a year of interest and progress.

At the beginning of the year the Junior Board of Trade was divided into two sections, namely: Civic and Commercial Affairs. The duties of the latter mentioned being to deal with matters pertaining to the welfare of the citizens of Charlottetown.

During the year eleven (11) council meetings and six (6) general meetings were held and our Board of Trade has been very active in its efforts to improve the housing quarters for soldiers stationed in our vicinity.

At the month of February 1940 the Junior Board of Trade became affiliated with the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada and the Women's National Organization from which we receive a considerable amount of work while corresponding.

This briefly outlines our work in the past year and I wish to take this opportunity on behalf of our members to thank the members of the Junior Board of Trade for their interest and cooperation in making the Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade a real worth while organization.

The Canadians were deeply disappointed at not being able to get into actual battle. Brig. Hal denby said Canada's brigade was "anxious to get at the enemy," and the orders to retreat were not well received.

"During our time in France we never saw the enemy on the ground," he said, "though there were considerable flying about in the air."

The troops reached their point of embarkation without any great difficulty, he said. The Canadians in the engine cab kept the French trainmen on the job.

He expects today to meet Premier Campbell and members of the "Provincial Government" in the House, and the Leader of the Opposition, to suggest the formation of a branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association in the Prince Edward Island Legislature.

As previously noted in connection with Sir Howard's visit, the Association is formed upon a non-party basis and branches exist in each Parliament of the Empire. Besides offering privileges to parliamentarians, the Association arranges from time to time conferences in which branches participate.

go to his nearest, or any, qualified medical doctor in good standing in Canada. It is advisable that he go to the nearest doctor as he must do at his own expense, but, and this is important, the man examined is not required to pay the doctor. The doctor is paid by the Government, and is so informed. The doctor will certify the man to be fit or unfit, as the case may be, for military training.

Doctors' Certificates "This brings me to some details of particular concern to the medical profession. I wish to request that the examining doctor insert on his certificate the serial number of the man examined. Such number always beginning with the letter 'I' to indicate the active division, is found on a notice which the man produces authorizing and ordering his medical examination. A place for such number is indicated in the upper left hand corner of the medical sheet. This is rather important as failure to insert such serial number entails work and delay in the office of the Registrar, which otherwise could be avoided.

Exemption Claims "As the call is for 30 days' military training only, and not for a full year, no individual claims for exemption are to be considered by the Board, except those by conscientious objectors of which I shall speak later. However, the Government recognizes that it would be unwise to ignore the interest to call certain groups who are engaged in farming, fishing, or other seasonal occupations during their busy season.

Serious Offence "It is a serious offence if any man called up fails to submit himself for a medical examination, or if he has been examined and certified fit, he fails to report for service in accordance with the notice sent him.

Spain Not Convinced Axis Partners Have Won Already By Kirke L. Simpson Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The battle of Britain roars on amid an exchange of lethal and verbal bomb blasts by the belligerents; but Spain has vowed to stay out. She is not convinced that her Nazi-Fascist friends have yet licked John Bull and his navy.

Spain Not Convinced Axis Partners Have Won Already "That is the crux of the war news on the political front. It has millions of British hearts deeper than the mere matter of Spain's future role in the struggle. It could go far toward reshaping the course of the war, or in the Mediterranean theatre.

Spain Not Convinced Axis Partners Have Won Already "The most obvious explanation for Spain remaining out of the war is Gen. Franco's apprehension that the British blockade of Spain would be a three-front attack which would see him as military dictator.

Spain Not Convinced Axis Partners Have Won Already "The other day I was in a district two minutes after it had been bombed," he continued. "There they were actually laughing. I saw one man kicking glass from a shattered window, then he threw out the blind which had been shattered into scores of pieces. This is an illustration of the British spirit."

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Consentious Objectors

"Now, coming back to conscientious objectors whom I referred to as one class the members of which may individually claim exemption, their position under the regulations is this: any man, who, from the doctrines of his religion is averse to active military service, may apply to the Registrar to have the Board postpone his training period indefinitely. To obtain such postponement, however, it must be established that such conscientious objector is a member of an organized religious denomination whose articles of faith prohibit him from bearing arms or undertaking combatant service.

On Permanent Basis A Dominion Conservative Association on a permanent basis has been the aim of leading members of the party for years. As long ago as 1934, soon after the party went out of power at the 1935 election, a constitution was drawn up for it. The war and the enrolment of members, however, prevented the party from carrying out its plan for the time being.

Employer's Responsibility "Some question has arisen as to the possibility of an employee losing his job by reason of his being absent for a month in training. It is expressly provided that it shall be the duty of the employer of any man called up to reinstate such man at the end of his training period in a job not less favorable than that which he would have had if he had not been called out at all, and any employer not so reinstating such man shall be liable to a fine or imprisonment, or both.

Spain Not Convinced Axis Partners Have Won Already "The first meeting scheduled by that of the New Brunswick Conservative Association at Fredericton Oct. 8. Spain Not Convinced Axis Partners Have Won Already "Hon. R. J. Manion, the leader chosen at the 1938 national convention, tendered his resignation to the caucus in May of this year. He failed to win a seat in the House at the general election on March 26. The party returned 38 members to the House, 245. Since then the strength of the party has increased to 39 as the result of a by-election.

A New Departure As a new departure in Canadian political activity members of the Association will be given a neat badge, also bearing the map and the letters "D.C.A." It will not be a party button like those sometimes issued in election campaigns, but an inconspicuous dressy affair which may be worn on all occasions on a man's coat lapel or a woman's dress. The membership cards of the organization will also be in blue and bear the Association emblem.

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
