FOR BETTER HEALTH.

An excellent letter from Dr. H. D. Johnson appears in another column of this issue. It is excellent for the information it affords, the valuable suggestions offered and for the spirit that prompts its publication. We speak for it a careful perusal.

We have a comparatively healthy Province. The annual death-rate of 9.22 per thousand compares favorably with other communities in Canada and in the world. Our people are of a vigorous stock. The majority following callings which give exercise to the muscles and fresh air to the lungs. Food and excellent water are abundant. Our climate is healthy and bracing. We ought to be the healthiest people in the world.

And yet, of the 950 deaths yearly in our small Province, we are told that nearly 30 per cent are due to preventable diseases, 142 being due to consumption alone. In correspondence with his brother physicians throughout the Province on this subject nineteen doctors report 246 cases of tuberculosis under their care and 36 deaths from that cause since the last of May.

This is the other and the pitiful side of the story. Dying needlessly, out of due time, perishing for lack of knowledge, many of them cut down in the bloom of youth, when life otherwise would be so full of hope and promise—surely this ought not to be.

"Better health for 1909" is a good watchword, a noble battlecry. Every intelligent man and woman knows that it is attainable. There is no doubt about it. Fresh air, cleanliness of person and premises, well-cooked food and good habits will do the trick and these are within the reach of all.

Dr. Johnson has hinted at a better ventilation of churches and public places of meeting. How many of our churches are thoroughly ventilated between the morning and evening services? We fear not many in the winter season. Ventilation is sacrificed to warmth and the evening congregation is breathing over the contaminated air of the morning to the detriment of their health and the dulling of their mental and spiritual perceptions.

EXPRESS DELAYS AGAIN.

Prince Edward Island is served in express business by the Canadian Express Company, which by dispensation of the higher authorities at Ottawa has exclusive rights on the Prince Edward Island Railway and the steamers connecting. A monopoly is not conducive to good service. The spur of competition is needed, and it is quite apparent that the Canadian Express gives better service on the mainland where it has to compete with another express company than is given the people of this Province.

The incident referred to in The Guardian of yesterday affords a case in point. We complained that a box of rollers shipped from Toronto on Thursday last had not yet arrived, although by either of two routes, on which trains were plying regularly the box could have come through and been delivered here on Monday.

Yesterday the box came to hand in Charlottetown, reaching here by the accommodation train at 12.10 in advance of the mail special which

connected with yesterday's steamer from Pictou. This makes it clear that the box had come through from Toronto to Pictou and on to Georgetown on time. Once on Island soil it was in the region of monopoly, and there a delay of twenty hours occurred. Fifty miles under monopoly consumed as much time in transportation as five hundred miles where there is competition.

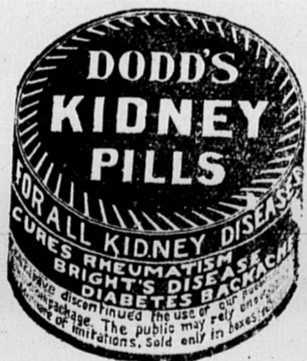
What this sort of thing means in case of urgency, and where every thing possible was done by wire messages between the consignee and the shipper to hurry things forward, can best be understood by those who have been annoyed and inconvenienced by life delays under similar circumstances. The Charlottetown Board of Trade is really dealing with an urgent matter in contending that we must have competition in express business in this Province as they have on the mainland before we can expect a prompt and dependable service.

The number of complaints that reach The Guardian in regard to delays, and overcharges as well in connection with the express service, and the fact that Mr. Haszard is now at Saint John to bring before the Board of Railway Commissioners a catalogue of grievances against the express service, along with our own experience in the case above cited, all go to show the need of radical reform in these matters and that without delay.

PARLIAMENT.

The Canadian Parliament will open at Ottawa today. The party choice having fallen upon Hon. Charles Maclellan, Speaker of the Commons, he will no doubt be elected to that position. It is an unwritten rule of Parliament that a French speaking member shall be chosen to succeed an English speaking member for that high position and the rule is a convenient and satisfactory one. Mr. Maclellan is by training a newspaper man. Those who heard him speak when he visited this Province during the election campaign must have been pleased with his easy, graceful and dignified manner.

The altered condition of Canadian finances, the disappearance of the surplus and the necessity for retrenchment in expenditure will have its effect upon the discussions and deliberations of Parliament. Always, too, in the first session of a newly elected House there are many echoes of the past political campaign which are more or less interesting from a party standpoint. We anticipate a rather lively session.
