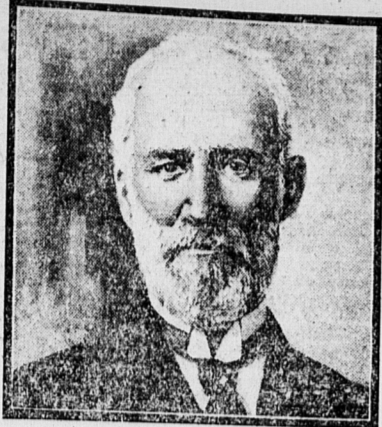

## ABLE SERMON ON FAITH

straight out into the trackless western ocean. That was faith—acting upon conviction.

One no longer questions the reasonableness of Jesus in His insistence upon faith as the condition of life. It is the one means of attainment in the spiritual world. To Jesus faith was not an accomplishment of mystics; it was a universal faculty to be exercised. He did not implant it. He evoked it. He summoned men to faith as He did to obedience, and the human soul, to the supreme work of the human soul, to Him unbelief was not a misfortune, it was a sin. He did not divide men into those who had faith, and those who had not, but into those who used their faculties and those who would not. The feeblest spark of faith he regarded with the highest hope, because it was the prophetic character. If He praised His friends, it was because of their faith; if He rebuked them, it was because of their unbelief. When He marveled it was either because of the lack of insight in those who knew Him best, or because of the greatness of the faith of one who had come from afar, and whose every authority suggested an authority transcending his own. The exercise of faith is not limited to the spiritual sphere; it is a factor in every phase of life. In the commercial and scientific worlds we are walking by faith every day of our lives.

Without faith, there was no scientific progress. What we call progress is only the making real the plans and visions of the unseen realities that first took form and substance in the imagination of the seers of the laboratories and the workshops. One laborer but turn to any account of a scientific discovery, like the following, for instance, to learn that faith is not a mere or insignificant thing, but that believing is the very heroism of intellect.

In 1884, Bessel, the great German astronomer, wrote to his countryman, Humboldt, that it was his firm belief that both Sirius and Procyon were double stars. For eighteen years thereafter the discrepancies in the observations of Sirius continued to indicate the existence of a companion to the chief brilliant of the fixed stars, before the eye confirmed the forecast of the mathematician. Finally, in 1862, Alvan Clark turned the inch glass he had just made for the Chicago telescope on Sirius, and there, right in the place which

Royal Highness I desire to convey, on my own and my wife's part, our heartfelt thanks for the unbounded kindness which we have at all times received from your Royal Highness, and not less from the beloved Princess of Wales. The devotion of an old man is little worth, but if at any time there be the smallest service which by information or suggestion, your Royal Highness may believe me capable of rendering, I shall remain as much at your command as if I had continued to be an active and responsible servant of the Queen.

These are very noble and pathetic words, and the Prince acknowledged them suitably, recording at the same time how greatly he valued the Princess had, for a long number of years, valued Mr. Gladstone's friendship. On May 25, 1898, the sealed coffin containing the mortal remains of the great statesman was brought to Westminster Hall to lie in state, and the Prince performed the last offices of friendship which he was among those who bore the pall at the funeral in the Abbey.

Friendships between Prince and Minister as pure and unaffected as this least among the virtues of Edward the Peacemaker, he was able to attract to himself and to offer to fifty years the devotion of one of the noblest spirits that ever breathed.

It had been predicted, shone the object responsible for the observed elliptical motion of the big star, Bessel did not live to see his faith rewarded. He died sixteen years before Clarke made his discovery. Modern astronomy, however, has confirmed the other part of the German scientist's statement to Humboldt. There is no doubt that Procyon is also a double star. In no other way can its action be accounted for, except on the hypothesis of an invisible companion. As yet no telescope has been able to reveal it, but the scientist's faith is not limited by his vision, and he knows that Procyon's companion is only waiting its Clarke to reveal it.

Faith is the very soul of this world. It is the bond which binds man to man, as well as man to God. Our entire system of credit, by which vast sums circulate without the use of a single coin, is nothing more or less than faith. Take faith from the business world, and every wheel of trade would be at a standstill immediately.

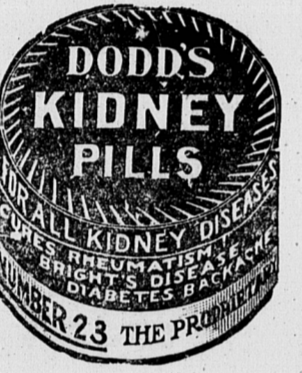
If, tomorrow, men should absolutely stop giving substance to things hoped for, every financial enterprise in the civilized world would set. It never occurs to a business man that he is abandoning his reasoning powers or doing an unreal thing when he speaks of investments and ventures, and the very words we carry us into the realm of the unseen. We treat the unknown as though it were known. When one fails he does not argue against the validity of the faith faculty. He merely concludes that his guidance in this case was insufficient.

Faith is the vision and the grasp of the soul which unites it with a power outside of itself. In the spiritual sphere it is the attitude and activity of the will which conjoins the life of man and the life of God. It is the very crown and glory of life. The power to believe proves our oneness with the eternal order. Faith gives a man his strength and pledges his attainment. It is always to the sure that the victory of life belongs. He lives in two worlds, and draws his forces from both.

Faith is to see the kinship between faith and the other faculties of the soul, many devout men have denied to faith the scientific spirit. Do they realize what an ally they have lost? Failing to recognize faith as the crowning intuition of the soul and forgetting that certainty follows, not precedes, action, many earnest men have waited for verification, and in the realm of the spirit have denied themselves the vision that gives them the mastery in every other realm. Do they realize what a friend they have lost?

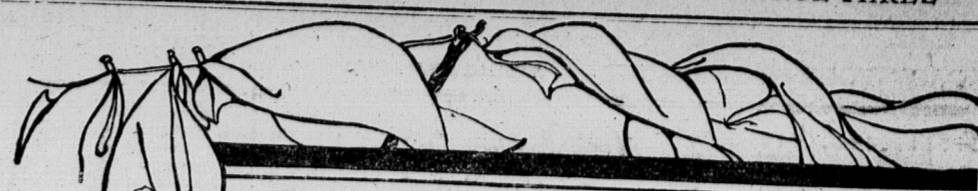
