Barrie Juniors Win 4-2 From Montreal

MONTREAL, April 11—(CP)—Barrie Flyers came roaring back from a 2-0 deficit here Saturday night to chalk up a convincing 4-2 triumph over Montreal Nationales in the opening game of the Eastern Canada Memorial Cup finals before 11,023 junior hockey fans.

The scene now shifts to Maple Leaf Gardens in Toronto where second game of the best-of-five series will be played Monday night.

Nationales, ahead 2-0 after 20 minutes of play, fell apart at the seams in the last two frames and the Flyers broke through for four straight goals.

Using their weight to good advantage, the Flyers' battering-ram defence corps, led by hard-hitting Ray Gariepy, took a heavy toll on the Nationales forwards in the initial session and had them slowed to a walk in the final two frames.

Jerry Reid, Rusty Alkin, Whit Mousseau and Gil St. Pierre con-

nected for Flyers while Claude Dolbec and Gerry Desautels hit the target for the Montrealers.

The fast-skating Ontario champs are noted for coming from behind to win games and Saturday night was no exception.

In the last game of the O.H.A. finals with Windsor, Barrie at one stage of the game trailed 6-3 but came through to win 6-3. Then in the first game of the all-Ontario series, Porcupine led 2-0 after 20 minutes of play but won the game by a wide margin.

STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

Shut Out Detroit 2-0 Last Night After 4-2 Victory Saturday

DETROIT, April 11—(AP)—Moving within a single victory of hockey's prized Stanley Cup, the Toronto Maple Leafs shut out the Detroit Red Wings 2-0 tonight before an overflow crowd of 14,168 fans, for their third win in as many games in the best-of-seven finals.

Harry Watson, a former Detroit, and Vic Lynn—both left wingers—registered the Toronto goals as big Walter (Turk) Broda turned away 26 Red Wing shots to score his first shutout verdict of the playoffs.

Watson came in to pick up a pass Bill Ezinicki dropped for him and slapped in a 10-foot shot that broke a fast scoreless tie just 18 seconds before the end of the second period.

Detroit, dead game and desperate, turned in on the pressure in the third but Broda stood it off in masterful style.

With less than five minutes of playing time left Lynn steamed up to the corner of the Detroit cage and waited for Ted (Teeter) Kennedy's pass, flicking it in easily past a badly flinched Lumley, who couldn't get back into position.

That was all the scoring but the Red Wings continued to bear in. Both Lynn and Watson shook loose for solo dashes in the final period.

But Bill Quackenbush, defence-man, cut Lynn down from the side and Watson's hurried shot a little later swept inches past the side of the net.

The game was jam-packed with penalties in the opening stanza, when referee George Gravel called seven, all of them minors, but there were just two penalties after that.

When Sid Abel, Detroit captain, raised a howl that Ezinicki charged into Lumley on Watson's goal tempers flared in front of the press-box and Abel and Jim Thomson of the Leafs squared off in what had all the earmarks of a brawl. It didn't spread too far, though, and Gravel finally restored order after sending both the principals off for major five-minute fighting penalties.

The heated play that had marked Toronto's 5-3 and 4-2 victories in the first two games at Toronto, didn't materialize beyond bare handful of minor flareups.

Harry Lumley turned back 14 Toronto shots as the Leafs were content to play mostly defensive after getting in front and putting the pressure squarely on the Red Wings. Lumley's best stop was on a first period shot Syl Apps blasted at him at the corner. Harry got his big mitt on it but juggled the puck and fell to the ice before he could catch it or the bounce right on the line.

Detroit's hope of making a battle of it the rest of the way was almost dead after the third straight licking. To win the battered old trophy now the Red Wings would have to take four straight games.

That's more than Detroit won from the Leafs in a dozen meetings during the regular season, when they tied four and won only two to Toronto's six.

The fourth game of the cup finals and the one in which Toronto can end it by winning is scheduled here Wednesday night.
