### BRITAIN URGES NEGOTIATIONS WITH GERMANY

#### Political Appeal Court Established Under New Road Act

Attack Launched Against Dictatorial Government Measure By Mr. Wade Hughes, Who, However, Could Muster Only Two Supporters When Vote Was Taken—Many Bills In Committee Yesterday.

Dictatorial power, taking away the right of appeal to an independent tribunal in the matter of lands and materials purchased for road-making purposes, will be vested with the Campbell Government if the Government's new Road Act, which yesterday passed committee stage in the Legislature, goes into effect.

Section 61 of the proposed Act constitutes the Executive Council as a court of final appeal from any valuations made by the Public Works Minister. Heretofore, appeal has been to the County Courts.

Led by Mr. Wade Hughes, Fifth King's, a strong attack was launched against the measure. When the vote was taken after recess, however, only three of the objecting members—Messrs. Hughes, Saville and MacKay, stood by their guns. The others either sided with the Government, or remained outside the bar of the House until the issue was decided.

Mr. MacKinnon (Fourth Kings), who at the morning session had predicted that the result would be discrimination in favour of Government friends, withdrew his objections at the afternoon session, and supported the bill.

Earlier in the day, Mr. J. Walter Jones scored a victory when the clause, limiting the speed of horses crossing Hillsboro Bridge to six miles an hour, put through over Mr. Jones' protests on the previous day, was amended to "an ordinary trot" by the Premier, who had himself voted for it previously. Mr. Jones maintained, however, that the section was still "a farce."

#### ROME REPORTS PEACE SOUGHT BY ETHIOPIA

Geneva, However, Claims Emperor Seeking Stronger Sanctions Against Italy.

(A. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) ROME, April 2.—Italian armies in Ethiopia passed deeper into new territory today as Emperor Haile Selassie was reported to have made peace overtures.

The first contacts, these sources declared, were communicated to Alessandro Lessona, Under-secretary of State for Colonies who recently returned from a tour of inspection in Ethiopia.

Counter-attacks by the personal troops of the Emperor were reported to have been repulsed as Italian troops moved toward the Lake Tana region of the east.

(An Ethiopian official communiqué, however, denied the defeat of Selassie's bodyguard.) Tension increased in the Italian capital as students attempted to stage a demonstration before the British consulate.

The officially controlled press asserted: "From today on, Ethiopia ceases to exist."

Demand Stronger Sanctions GENEVA, April 2.—Ethiopia, asserting that Italy "has redoubled its barbarity in waging a war of aggression upon a small people," demanded tonight that the League of Nations invoke stronger sanctions.

#### King Edward VIII To Be Crowned In May, 1937

(By Thomas T. Champion, Canadian Press Staff Writer) (C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 2.—(C. P. Cable)—King Edward VIII will be crowned in May next year—probably in May next year—on Thursday, May 27.

Prime Minister Baldwin announced in the House of Commons today that His Majesty had approved of arrangements for the coronation ceremony to take place in that month. The actual date, he added, would be announced as soon as possible.

#### GRAND JURY PROBES NEW DEVELOPMENTS

Further Stay In Execution of Hauptmann Seen — Governor Quizzed.

(By Samuel G. Blackman, Associated Press Staff Writer) TRENTON, N. J., April 2.—The Lindbergh kidnap-murder drama sped toward a new anti-climax tonight as a second execution eye for Bruno Richard Hauptmann found a grand jury considering the sharply divergent views of a governor and an attorney-general as to whether Hauptmann is guilty.

New Jersey, who had challenged the evidence that convicted Hauptmann, spent an hour and 15 minutes before the Mercer County (Trenton) grand jury which is investigating a charge Paul H. Wendel murdered the Lindbergh baby.

He was followed by Attorney General David T. Wilentz, who has fought successfully through six courts to sustain Hauptmann's conviction.

When he emerged nearly two hours later, Wilentz expressed the opinion that "even accepting Wendel's confession, there is no basis upon which a murder charge could be placed in this county."

#### NEW INDIA VICEROY SAILS

Marquess Of Linlithgow Given Cordial Send-off.

Champion Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, April 2.—The Marquess of Linlithgow was given a cordial send-off today as he left London on a start of a journey to India, where he will assume the post of Viceroy. He is succeeding the Earl of Willingdon, who was Governor-General of Canada 1926-31.

He will meet his predecessor on April 17 at government house, Bombay. The following day the Willingdons, after a farewell dinner by the Princes of India, will begin their homeward journey on the same ship.

Accompanying Lord Linlithgow are the Marchioness, their three daughters and a staff of six.

Lord Linlithgow was chairman of the royal commission on Indian agriculture, 1926-28 and chairman of the joint select committee of the two houses of parliament in 1933 which studied the gigantic new bill—since enacted into law—for constitutional reform in India.
