Penny-wise Housewives Plan Gardens

By KAY REX (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OTTAWA, April 15 - (CP) - Now that spring is here, penny-wise housewives are planning to save on food bills during the summer months.

Vegetables with the highest nutritional value should come first in this modern economy garden and the agricultural department officials suggest spinach, squash and carrots because of their vitamin A content.

The chief Canadian source of vitamin C, tomatoes should be grown both for use as fresh and canned.

If this is her very first crack at gardening, the lady with the spade would be well advised to buy plants of such crops as cabbage, cauliflower, and tomatoes, rather than trying to grow them from seed.

In British Columbia and southern Ontario tomato plants should not be set out in May or early June; in the Prairie provinces, late May to mid-June; in other parts of Ontario and Quebec, late May to late June.

Spinach, lettuce, early sprouting potatoes and radish are planted in mid April in British Columbia and southern Ontario; late June in Ontario and Quebec; late May to late June in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Carrots, squash, beets, beans and cucumber seeds are planted early to late May, or early June in British Columbia and southern Ontario; late May to mid-June in the Prairie Provinces; late May to late June in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Tips for Gardeners

Choose your garden site where there is constant sunlight. Soil filled with tree roots should be avoided as these roots will absorb plant food and moisture from the soil at the expense of vegetable crops.

Sandy loam, gravelly loam, and clay loam are the best soils for vegetable crops. The first two are

easy to work and are classed as "early" soils because they warm up quickly in the spring. But they have the disadvantage of losing moisture during dry weather.

While more difficult to work, the clay loam, with careful handling, will produce good crops of all kinds. Digging or plowing must not be done while clay loam soils are wet as it will cause lumpiness which makes preparation of a fine seed bed difficult.

Crops are grown best when planted in long rows. Consideration should be given to the amount of shade cast by taller growing plants. Tall plants such as corn, staked tomatoes and pole beans should be planted on the north side of the garden.

Well rotted manure is an excellent source of the organic matter essential to plant growth. It should be applied at the rate of 100 pounds or more to 100 square feet of garden area. This should be spread over the surface before plowing or digging.

The ground should be prepared just as soon as it is dry enough to work properly. It should be worked to a depth of eight or 10 inches.

Test Coffee Boiler For High Altitudes

MONTREAL, April 15 - (CP) - Making a hot drink in modern, high-altitude aircraft may seem simple to the passengers but it took scientists four months to make it safe for the stewardess working at the galley stove.

The trouble was that water boils at 197 degrees at 8,000 feet while the boiling point drops to 156 degrees at 30,000 feet, the cruising altitude for many transport aircraft with pressurized cabins.

With the pressure in the cabin equal to the air pressure at 8,000 feet to prevent discomfort to passengers, the breaking of a window while the plane is cruising at 30,000 would allow the water in a coffee pot to turn to live steam, possibly causing fatal scalds to anyone nearby.

McGill University experimenters built a boiler which they thought would solve the problem. Then they sought a means of testing it. The problem was overcome when they found an R.C.A.P. pressure chamber left over from wartime experiments. Pressure in the chamber was kept at 8,000 feet while the boiler "percolated" merrily.

Then suddenly the air was exhausted until it approximated 64,000 feet, by breaking a window leading into another chamber where a near vacuum existed.

The rush of air from the chamber was so great the moisture in it turned to a fine rain, but the boiler bubbled on without issuing clouds of live steam.
