NEWSY FARM NOTES

SALMAGUNDI

On Sept. 7, the large brown ants held their annual nuptial flight; this was followed as on previous occasions by rain, this time very slight. It is surely a wonderfully organized state which ordains that the flight must take place simultaneously. On the 14 a flight of grackles (crow-blackbirds) numbering several hundreds passed over the house, going S. W. I had never seen so many birds together at one time. The swallows left at least a week earlier this year, probably on account of scarcity of food, since the swamps which are the breeding ground of the insects upon which they feed, had long been dry. On the 10, occurred a violent electric storm which did some slight damage here. Disturbed atmospheric conditions with great loss were reported from countries as far apart as France and the Orange Free State, South Africa, on the 12. It would be interesting to know if general disturbances. Two heavy rains on the 14, and 15, have put the ground into condition for ploughing, though they have hampered the sowing of grain. The rain-gauge registered .55 and 1.03 inches respectively. The yellow golden-rods and the white and purple-blue asters are now in full bloom, harmonious colors, the last of the summer tribe. Judging by the wealth of hawthorn berries and those of the mountain ash, our forefathers would have said that there was a hard winter ahead of the feathered tribes, and that providence was taking care to supply their larder. However that may be, the passing year resembles the year 1921 in many respects and that dry year was followed by a very unpleasant winter. Let us hope this prognostication will fall. On the 12, I found a large number of Amanita muscaria, the Fly Toadstool, in a grassy glade. The fleshy fungi have been scarce this year, owing to the long drought.

MANAGEMENT OF SOIL

The progressive farmer will get many hints about soil management from Bulletin 72, New Series by Hopkins and Hopper. It deals with the problems presented to the Eastern agriculturist in the course of tillage and rotation. One such problem is that of surface erosion where the land is hilly; which means that certain soils are apt to wash down at surface times and form deposits at a lower level. Most of the alluvial lands on the banks of rivers have formerly been deposited in such a fashion and are as a rule the most fertile of soils. This erosion is not so marked where the hillside is covered with a growing crop, and very steep hills are better kept in permanent pasture for that reason. As however a certain amount of fertility is always lost where there is a wash it is a good policy to assist the pasturage by judicious fertilizing, as has often been recommended by the authorities at the Experimental Farm. When it is necessary to plough a hillside it should never be ploughed up and down, but "contour" ploughing should be resorted to, that is the ridges must run crosswise to the slope. Such ploughing breaks up the "wash" and retains the moisture for the use of the coming crop.

N. B. HUNTING SEASON OPENED

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 23.—With the opening of the hunting season in New Brunswick, which was postponed on account of lack of rain, parties of sportsmen, are now reaching the Maritime Provinces and a very successful season is anticipated. With the adoption of game refuges by both the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia governments, ample big game hunting is assured and reports are that it is very plentiful this year. A large party from Philadelphia is expected to arrive in New Brunswick big game woods over the Canadian National Railway's next week several prominent sportsmen being among the number.

TRACTORS FOR ALPINE ROADS

Tractors have invaded the land of the St. Bernard dogs, and are keeping the famed passes of the Alps clear of snow this winter. The Swiss Postal Department has installed a fleet of high-powered endless tread machines to keep the highways open. Powerful spotlights on the machines make night work possible when necessary. The machines have been kept busy recently.

APHIDES

One result of the heavy rains aforementioned is a check to the multiplication of the aphid or green-fly which threatened the root crops. These pests insert their sharp sucking mouthparts into the soft tissue of the plants and drain out the sap, thereby producing injuries varying from the curling of the leaves to the death of the plant. They attack all parts from the roots and stems to the fruit and as a side-product they excrete a sweetish liquid, known as honey-dew, on which a sooty fungus flourishes; so that what they do not directly destroy they often defile and render unsightly. Aphids too have been found to be responsible to a great extent for the spread of several plant diseases, notably raspberry and potato mosaic and leaf roll. The propagation of these insects is one of the marvels of nature. The eggs are laid in autumn on the food plant and from them are hatched in spring a generation of wingless females. All through the summer from them is produced by parthenogenesis (without the intervention of a male) generation after generation of winged and wingless females which again reproduce their kind after the same fashion. This they are able to do at a week old and as each may bear fifty young the rate of increase is enormous. Each as soon as born begins to suck the juice of the host so that the plant is soon covered by chains of the tiny creatures. Towards fall true males and females appear and the fertilized eggs are laid for the succeeding year's outbreak. Spraying with soapuds is an old homely and effective way of dealing with aphids but those who require fuller information about their control may be referred to Pamplet 31 New Series, "Aphids or Plant Lice," by the Dominion Entomologist, Ottawa.
