Increased Wool Needs

Canadian wool requirements have been substantially increased in the last few years due largely to the manufacture of military clothing...

Closely associated with the programme of increased production is the question of providing an efficient marketing system, based on federal wool grading regulations.

During the past year grading was carried out in a total of twenty-six registered wool warehouses located at suitable points throughout the Dominion.

A feature of the present regulations is that the identity of all growers' clips must be maintained until they are officially graded.
