Guest Speaker At Christian Church



Mr. M.L. Breakenridge M.A., F.D. (above) will be guest speaker during the two weeks of Evangelistic meetings to be held in Central Christian Church, Charlottetown during the first two weeks of November. Before coming to Summerside, where he now serves the Central Avenue Christian Church, Mr. Breakenridge served in the State of Indiana. Prior to this three years were spent in the R.C.A.F. as navigation instructor. A short period of this time was spent at the Summerside station. A native of Calgary, Alberta, his high school and senior work was taken in that city. He entered training in the Alberta Bible College and from it he graduated in 1942. He later served as Principal of this college for the most of two years. In taking post-graduate work Mr. Breakenridge entered Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana from which he graduated with the degree of Master of Arts and Bachelor of Divinity. Having attained highest honors he was elected member of the International Society of Theta Phi, an honor society for ministers and religious workers.

Defence Training - "Whereas the late Colonel J.L. Ralston, speaking in Montreal in 1946, reminded Canadians that our Dominion is no longer an isolated country, but one of the 'Middle West' as it is within sixty hours flying from any part of the world, and that therefore Canada must take its place in the world. "And as General Crerar, Commander of the Canadian Army, in 1947 stated: 'Only by adoption of compulsory universal military training in peace will this country ever possess the practical potential in armed forces which would be required should war be suddenly thrust upon us.' "And as Field Marshal Lord Montgomery recently stated: 'In the hand of strength lay the keys of peace.' "He is resolved that this Annual Convention assembled at O'Leary reiterate the resolution adopted by the annual convention of this Command at Summerside in 1947 and at former conventions, urging that a system of compulsory training in the defence forces of the Dominion is the only sane, efficient and democratic system which will enable Canada to place a trained force quickly in the field for its defence, and the discharge of those obligations which rest upon us by virtue of our partnership in the Empire.

Illegal Practices at Elections - "Whereas under the Dominion and Provincial Election Acts, it is unlawful to engage in corrupt practices, including the buying and selling of votes and the use of intoxicating liquor for election purposes. "And whereas the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion deplores the increasing disregard of the above legislation and believes that the prevailing indifference to the moral and legal principles involved will inevitably result in the deterioration of our democratic system of Government. "Therefore he is resolved that the leaders, elected representatives and members of all political parties be urged to publicize and enforce the existing legislation in a sincere effort to halt this dangerous practice.

Former Pupils Pay Warm Tribute To Prof. Barlow

On the eve of the forty-ninth anniversary of his arrival here from England Prof. Percy Barlow, retired manual training instructor for the city schools, was last night honoured by a large number of his former pupils at a surprise party held at the home of Mrs. W. M. Brehaut, Rochford Street, and presented with an illuminated address accompanied by a well-filled purse and the warmest personal expressions of appreciation and esteem. The address was presented by Mrs. Justice Tweedy, and the purse and list of pupils by Judge H. L. Palmer. Informal addresses were made by several former pupils, including Mr. C. F. Hine, principal of West Kent School, who also spoke on behalf of Queen Square School in the absence of Principal MacDonald. An appreciative letter was read from another former pupil, Group Capt. H. R. Stewart, of Ottawa, by Mr. Wallace Scantlebury. Completely taken by surprise, Prof. Barlow spoke feelingly of his many happy associations with his "boys", and recalled some humorous instances in connection with his long experience as a teacher. An enjoyable social time was spent after the presentation, refreshments being served by a committee of ladies of the School Improvement League. Following is the text of the address: "To Percy Barlow, Esq., Teacher. "Having learned of your retirement from active teaching, a number of your former pupils felt that they could not let the occasion pass without expressing in a very humble and inadequate manner their great admiration and respect for you. "To have been a pupil of yours, sir, was one of the richest experiences that could come to any man. "The Great Teacher of all was a carpenter's son. You, by your many qualities of heart and mind, have shown yourself to be a true follower of His. The kindly interest you always showed in each and every one of your pupils spurred many a wayward lad to better efforts. "The lessons learned in your classroom bore fruit not only within the schools and colleges where you taught, but far beyond in every walk of life. "What pupil could hear you repeatedly say 'All receding parallel lines vanish to one point and that point is called the vanishing point', without having impressed upon him one of the great truths of the universe?"

Labor Official Investigates Here

Pettigrove, Industrial Relations Officer for the Department of Labor in the Maritimes and Newfoundland carried out an investigation during the past two days regarding the application of the Charlottetown Labor Protective Union for certification as bargaining agent on behalf of the longshoremen employed by several local firms. The firms involved are the P. E. I. Industrial Corporation, Bunatain and Bell Co., H. E. Willis Incorporated and the Island Fertilizer Company. Mr. Pettigrove conferred with the management officials Wednesday afternoon and the union officers yesterday. Mr. Pettigrove will report his findings to the Canadian Relations Board at Ottawa where the matter will be considered at their next meeting. Mr. Pettigrove left this morning for Fredericton.
