THE LOBSTER SEASON—About 500 pounds, to the boat, was the average of all week's catch. The weather was very unfavorable the first week and all along the North Side, only on two days, Thursday and Saturday, were the boats able to launch out. It certainly was not a favorable opening week. This week, however, opened up fine and calm and better things are assured. All around the coast almost complete dependence is placed on the lobster fishing. Farming operation is not in it, so to speak. Possibly thirty per cent of the farmers residing along the North Shore, from Cable Head to East Point, are either themselves or the sons, lobstering this spring. All of them, or nearly so, have hired men doing the farming at home. The majority, however, have the advantage of fishing at or near home so that in most cases they may be home at night and observe how the hired man is progressing, which is quite an advantage. As to prices for lobsters this year there is no price yet fixed as a general thing though it is generally presumed that at least \$8 per cwt. will be paid. Packers are unable yet to fix a price, and the fishermen are so anxious to get traps and fish—nothing else doing—that they are willing to leave the matter with the packers. Only in one case has the packer agreed to pay \$10 per cwt. But the majority of the fishermen fish on "halfings" and get but half these prices. Nothing is heard this spring about the certified seed potato business, nor of large purchases of fertilizer and of certified seed, as was so general this time last year. Farmers on the whole are very pessimistic this spring and show no enthusiasm over the spring work. Seed oats are scarce, and many must be purchased involving high cash and late sowing. From East Point to Cable Head there are 16 factories in operation covering the whole area and about 128 boats and 255 men and approximately 40,000 (forty thousand) traps. That's big investment or preparation for the season's work. In a good year an average of 10,000 lbs. per boat would only be considered fair. But since the failure last year, an average of ten thousand to the boat will probably be considered satisfactory. That at eight dollars per cwt. would bring a lot of money, possibly \$100,000. That it may. Across from East Point to the Cape Breton and N. S. coast towards Cape George, thirteen factories now in full operation are paying the fishermen \$8 per cwt., straight and where conditions are about the same as the North Shore of our island.

service was left for long under an acting Minister without experience or knowledge of immigration and engrossed with other duties. Inefficiency has in consequence marked its operations. What was done to promote immigration from the British Islands was devised by the British Government and might have been fruitful of good results had not the Ottawa authorities neglected any attempt to co-operate until the golden opportunity which Australia and other Dominions were quick to seize was largely lost and the current of British immigration was turned away from Canada to other lands.

In our own Province we all know what has occurred. The officers of Immigration and Publicity Agent was closed by the late government owing to the advanced age of the official holding the position and as a general election was then near no new appointment was made. The King Government came in, but have left the office unfilled during their entire term of power. As a specimen of the efficiency of the Immigration Department under the new regime it may be mentioned that the retired Immigration agent in Charlottetown continued to receive official communications and instructions from the Department years after he had been retired and these only ceased to come after repeated notifications from him that he was no longer in office.

What happened to those retired British army officers in the Andrew-Fraser Mitchell episode affords further indication of the sort of efficiency which has prevailed and is still going on in the Immigration Department, and we fear in other Departments, where the big salaries yield a rich harvest month by month throughout the year—never falling in winter or summer—and quite regardless of the growth or failure of the farmers' crop.

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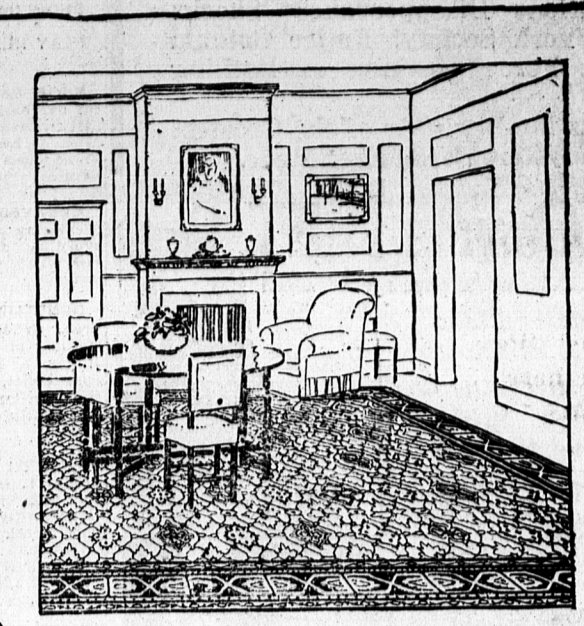

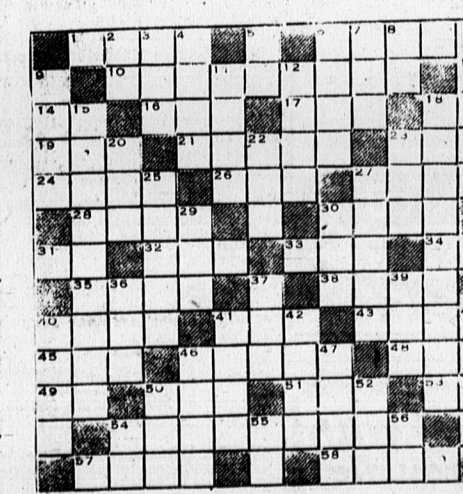
