Our farmers have splendid crops this year I notice says the visitor and that is the back bone of a country's prosperity, but I see your city is growing some and there is some splendid new buildings been put up since my last visit have you added any new industries lately?

Well yes we have replied the local merchant THE CHARLOTTE TOWN MILLING CO have recently resumed operations and are making flour here now.

N. S. and P.E.I. Retail Merchants Will Meet Here

In preparation for the sixth annual convention of the Retail Merchants Association of Canada, Inc., for the provinces of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island which opens in Charlottetown on Tuesday next, Aug. 15th an interesting booklet has been prepared and forwarded to members of the association. The annual report of president A. J. Reid of Nova Scotia, the report of secretary J. C. Doyle, a cordial invitation to Charlottetown president Chas. H. Chandler, secretary W. A. Stewart and ex-president S. A. MacDonald and a programme of the forthcoming convention are included in the booklet, which is illustrated with cuts of several prominent retail merchants, including Mr. Chandler.

In his presidential report Mr. Reid emphasizes the fact that while Canada may be faring better than other countries since the war, living conditions are never theless bad enough. It is necessary that all classes of citizens should realize the importance of working together, and that a somewhat equitable interchange of the products of the labor of the different classes of our people is absolutely necessary to our continued prosperity. Agriculture is the basic industry of the country, and the prosperity can only come by giving the food-producer sufficient return for his labor. The fact that the farmer cannot pay for the amount of goods he needs or which he has been accustomed to receive a large surplus of manufactured goods to be marketed elsewhere, which owing to the abnormally high cost of production is proving to be a rather difficult matter. Labor should render a full week's service for a rate of payment corresponding to that received by the men producing food, thus bringing about an equitable exchange of products.

Secretary J. C. Doyle, of the Nova Scotia association in his report states that the Dominion Convention held this week at Halifax is the first of its kind held in the Maritime Provinces and it is hoped by calling the Maritime convention next week that the members of the Dominion executive will remain over to attend the Charlottetown conference. The last Maritime convention was held on February of this year at Truro. The present year has been one of the worst the retail merchant class has been called upon to face. The decline in the value of stock, the decline in buying and the large amount of unemployment necessitated exercising the greatest amount of caution in buying as well as in reducing overhead expenses in order to weather the squall. The membership of the association, however, has kept up very well. The actual paid membership list last year up to 31st August 1921, was 918 and on July 31st 1922, it was 768, a decrease of 150 members, which is not so great as might have been expected under the circumstances.
