Reviews Activities In Department Of Justice

"This is the second year in which the revenues of this Province will go over five million dollars," noted Hon. F.A. Large, Attorney General, in speaking last week in the Legislature during the Budget debate.

Justice Department... Since he became associated with the Department of Justice in 1944 the relations with the Supreme Court had always been harmonious, said Mr. Large who noted that there had been a large number of appeals on which the crown had been successful in most cases.

Prohibition Plebiscite... An amount of \$7,500 is estimated to look after the plebiscite which would be held in June. That is included in the total of \$30,500.

Prohibition Plebiscite... Due to the expansion of the Department of Education the Attorney General's office had to be moved to the Court House building, but he hoped that more suitable quarters would be available in future.

Prohibition Plebiscite... Mr. Large noted that in 1934 a total of some \$168,000 had been paid in Old Age and Blind pensions and that in 1947 the amount had increased to \$486,000.
