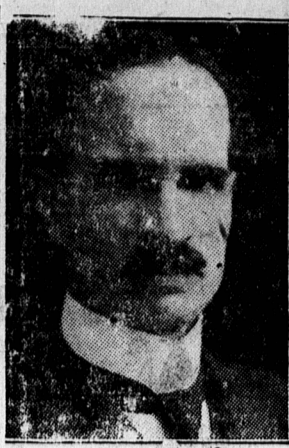

PARIS, Nov. 6.—Young Count Stanislaus De La Rochefoucauld firmly refuses to break off his engagement to marry Miss Alice Cocea, a musical comedy star, and the blue-blooded De La Rochefoucauld family is in despair. Miss Cocea made her hit on the stage when she appeared in "Phi-Phi," during its phenomenal run. The day has passed when a Frenchman could not marry without the consent of his parents. Now, if between the ages of 21 and 25, he has only to inform his parents, by two "respectful summonses" of his intention to marry, and after he has reached the age of 25 he is free to marry when and whom he chooses. Stanislaus is 23 and has made his "respectful summonses" in due, legal form.

New Cancer Cure Is Demonstrated

ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 7.—According to an article signed and copyrighted by H. C. Hamilton, and appearing in today's issue of the Atlanta Constitution, Dr. H. F. Harris, a prominent Atlanta physician, appeared last night before the meeting of the Fulton County Medical Society and demonstrated a cure for cancer which consisted of the ionization of uranium sulphate in the cancer.

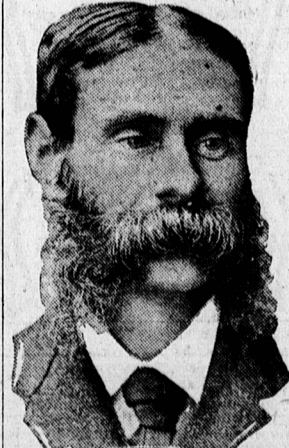
To produce ionization, the physician uses two electrodes, one bearing a piece of cotton saturated with uranium sulphate and placed upon the growth. The other pole is placed opposite the place to be treated and the current from an ordinary 45 volt radio battery gradually turned on.

Dr. Harris explained that by ionization every part of growth is permeated by the uranium sulphate solution which is radio-active producing the same results as when radium is used, but vastly more effective, since the entire growth is treated.

SCAR TISSUES. Dr. Harris said the ionization method of local treatment had also been applied successfully by him to the removal of scar tissues and that marvelous results had been attained in the removal of adhesions following pleurisy, removal of scars from burns, healing of ulcers, treatment of pyrrhoia and almost every local disease. Different drugs are used in different cases, the ions of iodine and chlorine having been found specially effective in the treatment of scars.

Dr. Harris is native of Alabama. He has worked for 27 years on cancer studies. He is recognized by the United States Public Health Service as one of the greatest authorities on pellagra, and was honored by the Philadelphia College of Physicians for research accomplished in cancer.

Mr. McDonald was a man of splendid physique and intellectual ability, always taking an active part in the important questions of the day. AN APPLE A DAY.

Eat more fruit and keep your skin clear would perhaps be an apt slogan for Canadian fruit growers to adopt. In this connection possibly no fruit would better fill the bill than apples, of which a bulletin issued by the Fruit Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, entitled "Canadian Grown Apples" says, "From a dietetic standpoint the most important function of the apple is that of mineral salts and organic acids; but it has an important nutritive value as well, furnished by the carbohydrates present. As the fruit ripens starch changes to sugar. The apple has a medicinal value also, especially if eaten at the beginning of a meal or between meals." The bulletin further remarks that no housewife should be without a box or barrel of Canadian grown apples and then proceeds to give a list of the varieties that should be used at different times as follows:—

September.—Duchess, Alexander, Maiden's Blush, St. Lawrence, and similar varieties.

October, November, December.—Gravenstein, Wealthy, Hubbardston, McIntosh Red, Fameuse, Blenheim, Ribston, and similar varieties.

January, February.—Baldwin, King, Wagener, Greening, Seek, Peewaukee, Ontario, Jonathan, Yellow Newtown, and similar varieties.

March, April, May.—Spy, Golden Russet, Ben Davis, Stark, Fallwater, Roxbury Russet, Spitzenberg, Rome Beauty, and similar varieties.

MINERALS FOR SWINE

A lack of lime in the ration of pregnant sows may cause dead pigs. At the Wisconsin station they have been able to take sows which have formerly produced normal litters and cause them to produce considerable numbers of dead pigs by the simple process of reducing lime in the ration. They have been able at a later farrowing to bring about normal pigs by feeding a ration rich in lime.

The following mineral mixture is used in the swine feeding at the Ontario Agricultural College. It is giving good satisfaction: 4 bushels charcoal or hardwood ashes.

8 pounds salt, 2 quarts air slaked lime, 1 pound sulphur, 10 pounds of bone meal. This preparation is kept in a suitable box in each pen, where it may be taken by the swine at will.

BORN IN THE CLOUDS.

While the cruiser Dana was open for inspection at Auckland, New Zealand, a baby was born in commemoration of her birthplace the baby is being called Dana and as a memento the ship's officers presented the new-come with a beautifully-bound edition of the "Legend of Dana," together with a gold brooch bearing a reproduction of the ship's coat of arms.

A year or so ago a baby was born in a London Tube train. A reminder of the event is incorporated in the baby's Christian name.—Thelma Ursula Beatrice Eleanor, the initials of which make "Tub."

Many babies are born at sea, but it is doubtful if any entered such a troubled world as a German baby girl born in mid-Atlantic during place.

C. N. R. A. Broadcast To British Isles

(Special to The Guardian.)

MONCTON, Nov. 7.—There was a wide and immediate response last night to the invitation extended by C. N. R. A. that listeners in should make known their impressions of two special broadcasts transmitted from the Atlantic Coast Station of the Canadian National Railways.

These responses came by way of the telegraph and the telephone and covered a great stretch of territory indicating that C. N. R. A. had successfully bridged immense areas by land and by sea.

The first of these special broadcasts was for the purpose of furnishing a distinct entertainment for the owners of receiving sets in the British Isles and on the continent of Europe while the second special broadcast was more directly intended for listeners—in throughout Canada and the United States. The first programme was in line with the policy of the radio department in offering occasional transmission intended to cross the Atlantic while the second was to mark the fact that C. N. R. A. has completed one year in service and is now starting out on the second year with the same purpose in view of serving the unseen and uncounted radio audiences. For this special occasion the station had been thoroughly overhauled and every part of the important mechanism completed so that at this ordinarily excellent line in the Canadian National chain was in such condition as to make it outstanding in the excellence of its broadcasting particularly in regard to clarity and strength of signals. Of its type C. N. R. A. has no rival on the Atlantic but as there are always atmospheric conditions which cannot be foretold in advance everything possible was done in advance by skilled radio engineers to see that the impulses were properly initiated so as to reach the intended destinations.

C. N. R. A. has become quite well known across the Atlantic since its inception a year ago and has done a great deal to further the claims of Canada. Two splendid programmes were offered last night's having been prepared so as to give as diversified a selection as possible making a nice balance between vocal and instrumental music including some numbers performed on a beautifully toned harp and others with bagpipes not necessarily by way of contrast but because the latter instrument broadcasts wonderfully well. The two programmes included a large number of performers from Maritime communities and these ladies and gentlemen were most admirable in displaying their varied and several talents and from that point of view alone the event reached the standard of a musical festival.

The instrumentalists included the Markowski Trio, a group of splendid musicians and Miss Ruth Sailer of North Sydney whose performance on the harp were most felicitous. Because of the importance of the occasion Mr. W. D. Robb, vice president Can. Nat. Rys. travelled from Montreal to personally supervise the broadcast, the radio department being one of the numerous activities under Mr. Robb's direction. Mr. Robb delivered a special address through the microphone dealing specifically with the opportunities that present themselves in Canada, and more particularly to the people of the United Kingdom, declaring Canada can satisfactorily meet the need of Great Britain for an outlet to its over-crowded sections.

Again, Mr. Robb said, we can offer to the world a wide variety of the desires of any energetic person who wishes to establish a home in the fair dominion, Canada possesses thousands of acres of arable lands for the ambitious settlers in exhaustible natural resources awaiting the coming of the diligent toilers and vast wealth of fisheries and minerals. The vice president extended a warm welcome to those anxious to settle in new homes saying that they would find here happiness and prosperity. Mr. Robb also invited the traveller and the sportsman to visit the Dominion assuring each of gorgeous scenic beauties and plentiful game and concluded Canada is big, Canada is bright and best of all Canada is British.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Nov. 7.—Canadian egg markets remain generally firm today with the exception of Vancouver where a further price decrease is noted. Fresh quotations continue to advance on American markets and future prices remain steady. Toronto egg market is unchanged with the exception of fresh firsts which are quoted 45 to 50 good quality. Dressed turkey jobbing at 35—42 geese 20—22.

Calgary egg market is firm, the future prices remain steady. Jobbing extras \$12.95, firsts \$12.00 seconds \$9.50. Poultry market is steady chickens 13 heavy fowl 11 light fowl 8 turkeys and geese not quoted. Edmonton no fresh eggs are arriving, jobbing storage extras 45 firsts, 40 seconds, 35 live poultry steady and unchanged.

Vancouver egg market is easy and unsettled with supplies increasing dealers paying country prices extras 60 firsts 58 jobbing extras 65 firsts 63 seconds and pullets 53. Halifax no change in egg or poultry markets. St. John jobbing fresh extras 55 firsts 50 seconds 43 storage firsts 47, seconds 42, fresh killed chickens wholesale 35 fowl 30. There is a fair quantity arriving.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 8.—The only business of importance transacted on the domestic market today was the sale of a few loads of Canadian western no 8 barley at 9 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg November option and no 4 grade at six cents per bushel over C. I. F. Montreal. There was some demand from local and country buyers for supply available on the spot. There were no new developments in the spring wheat flour market prices being well maintained with steady business passing with local and country buyers. The trade for export account was quiet. Prices for all grades of milled were well maintained owing to the continued good demand for domestic consumption and the fact that the offerings are none too large to meet the present requirements. The trade in standard grades of roll of oats was steady and prices were unchanged.

The condition of the market for baled hay was unchanged prices for all grades being steady under a good demand from all sources. The undertone to the market for strictly fresh eggs was firm but prices were not further changed. A fair trade was done in storage grades. The strength which has characterized the market for potatoes all this week continues to be the main feature of the situation. Prices scored a further advance of twenty five cents per bag.

The butter market was quiet but steady. An easier feeling developed in cheese and prices were reduced ¼ to ½ per pound. Car lots of oats and sales of Ontario and Quebec no 2 white made at 52 cts. no 3 white 50 ½ cts. and no 4 white at 49 cts per bushel ex track. A feature of the flour trade was the stronger feeling that developed in the market for winter wheat. Grades and prices were marked up 15 cts. per barrel which was attributed to the higher figures asked by the Ontario millers the very limited offerings from them and the small supplies available on spot.

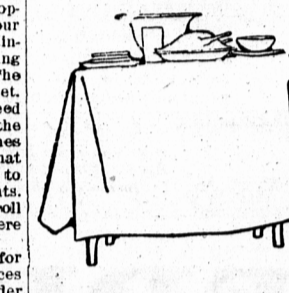
