URGES ACTION ON FEDERAL COMBINES

OTTAWA, June 1—(CP)—Where a combine such as the paperboard and industries throughout the country, direct action should be taken by the National Government rather than to wait for possible action by the Provincial Attorneys-General, R. J. Deachman (Lib. Huron North) urged in the House of Commons today.

Because such a combine affects the national life of the country, the remedy and punishment were a national affair, he contended.

The combines commissioner had reported a rigidly-controlled paperboard combine on March 14 last, but the combine had continued in defiance of the report, Mr. Deachman said. It seemed necessary then that the House of Commons should take a more potent remedy as provided in the Customs Act.

That act provided that where a combine was proven the Governor-in-Council might admit specific goods free of duty if the disadvantage to the consumer had been mitigated by the customs duty. The remedy thus existed to make the work of the combines commissioner effective.

Labor Minister Rogers pointed out that normal procedure required the turning over of such combines reports to the Provincial Attorneys-General for action.

The three remedies under the Combines Investigation Act itself were publicity, heavy fines after court conviction, and removal or reduction of the customs tariff which permitted the maintenance of a combine.

In the first instance the desire was to adhere to the procedure of reference to the Attorney-General. Since the act came into force in

1923, the provinces had failed to prosecute in only one case, Mr. Rogers said.

Mr. Deachman read a letter from a Mr. Shipman, an independent paperboard container manufacturer showing that retail prices dropped 38 per cent from last October to March, while raw material dropped almost 17 per cent in the same time.

His company, a member of the combine, had offered to undercut that price by five per cent, the difference presumably being made up by the combine. The picture thus was of members of the combine trying to put out of business a competitor of the combine.

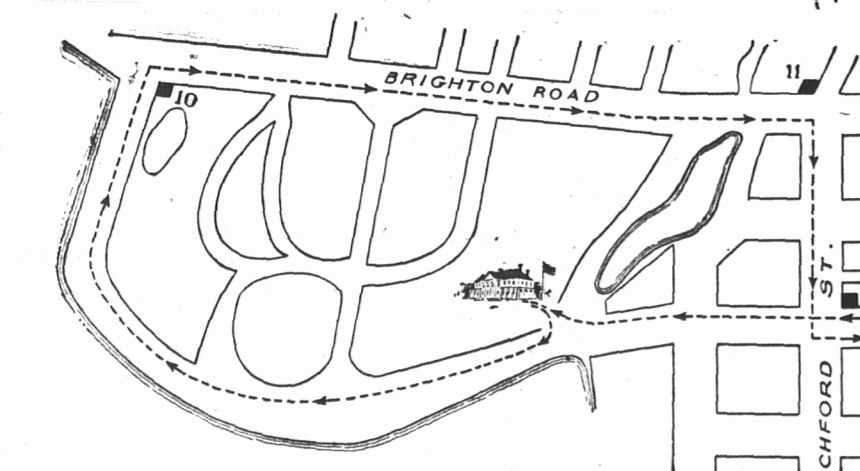
