Hole-in-one By Somerville Features Golf Title Play As Field Is Narrowed Down

LONDON, Ont. July 27—(CP)—Out of two rounds of the Canadian Amateur Golf Championship today came the first scattered upset matches, a hole in one by Champion Sandy Somerville and a temporary bogging down of play when a terrific rain and thunderstorm broke over the course in the afternoon.

Sixteen players enter tomorrow morning's fourth round and that number will be whittled in half for the afternoon play. Of the 16 left, four are United States players who have shown steady golf through the rounds since yesterday morning and the international aspect of the tournament gives promise of continuing.

The first real upset came in this morning's second round when Marvin (C) Wentworth of Montreal, one of three bowleg men who started, eliminated Ken Black of Vancouver, considered one of the best bets from the west.

Lost His Clubs
Black's surprising defeat however, came on top of the loss of his clubs. His bag disappeared overnight and a frantic search failed to disclose it.

Wentworth passed from the picture in the afternoon at the hands of Dick Lutz, of Ashland, O.

Somerville's remarkable shot came on the fifth hole in the afternoon round. Playing against R. G. Ellis of Montreal, Sandy drove from the fifth tee for the 185 yard hole. The ball struck in front of the cup, rolled up and partly dropped, held by the flag.

The shot put him one up. He went on to win the match 5 and 7 with R. C. Storey of Saint John.

The eastern ranks were thinned today but those left pack a punch. They include Somerville, Phil Parley of Montreal and the two Gordons—Gordon B. of Toronto.

Kelly Still Survives
L. B. Bissell of London, Thames Valley and Pete Kelly of Charlottetown complete the easterners in the field, an even half dozen. Western Canada also has six players left, and the United States four.

Canadians Confident On Eve Of Davis Cup Test

MONTREAL, July 27—(CP)—Trained to the peak of condition three young Canadian netmen were ready tonight for the opening of a new era in the Dominion's Davis Cup history.

Ross Wilson of Toronto and Bobby Murray and Laird Watt of Montreal were named to carry the Dominion's challenge against Japan in the semi-final round of the North American zone trials.

The series starts tomorrow on Mount Royal Tennis Club's grass courts and marks Canada's return to top play after a two-year absence.

E. Henri Laframboise, non-playing captain of the Canadians and a former Davis Cup player himself spoke for his men tonight and said "we are very, very confident of winning the series." And observers who have watched the team at work the last 10 days echo his opinion.

Wilson, speedball of the Canadians, will do double duty for his country meeting Punitero Nakano in the singles match tomorrow and pairing Murray and Watt against Nakano and Jiro Yamagishi in the doubles Friday. Murray and Yamagishi will meet in the second singles tomorrow in the second singles.

Final two singles matches will be played Saturday with Wilson drawn against Yamagishi and Murray against Nakano. However, Douglas Cameron of Vancouver and Yasumine Kuramitsu of Japan who did not get starting assignments for the series will play on the last day if the series winner is decided before then.

Laframboise and non-playing captain Abe of Japan staged a light drill for their teams today. Fred Perry, British ace who has been coaching the Canadians for more than a week, worked singles with each player and at the finish said he was "most pleased" with their showing.
