COMING MEETING CAUSES INTEREST.—The announcement of the returned soldiers' mass meeting is causing considerable interest not only among the returned men but also the citizens. The executive of the Charlottetown G. W. V. A. are organizing this gathering not only among the returned men are desirous of keeping together to protect their rights and to insist that the promises made by the country during the war are fulfilled. The outcome of the meeting will no doubt be looked forward to by all. If rumors are going to have a bumper house as one hears the matter being discussed on all sides. It is understood that some sensational matters are to be brought up for consideration. Politicians are no doubt watching the returned men closely as the question of political intervention has been rumored for sometime. This meeting is the first of its kind in Charlottetown and any speculation as to the outcome is impossible.

Former French Premier Given Severe Ordeal

PARIS, Feb. 24.—Continuing his defense today on the charge of having had treasonable dealings with the enemy, Former Premier Cailleux said he had met Pierre Lenoir, executed in October, 1918, on being found guilty of having had intelligence with the enemy, but twice, and M. Duval, director of the newspaper Bonnet, Rouge who was executed in July, 1918, only once. His relations with Miguel Almeraya, editor of the Bonnet Rouge, who was sentenced to five years imprisonment in connection with the Bala Pasha case and died mysteriously in prison, according to Cailleux, were slight. He said he was suspicious of Almeraya.

Concerning Bala Pasha, M. Cailleux told of frequent meetings with him at luncheons and dinners in his own home and the residence of Bala. These meetings, he said, were due to gratitude of Bala's attitude and sympathy in 1914 when the greatest catastrophe which ever befell a public man was visited upon me.

Continuing his defense, he considered Bala Pasha innocent of the accusations against him, and treated him affectionately, even while under suspicion early in 1917. He severed relations with Bala only when telegrams from the United States were received. M. Cailleux added that not only was he satisfied that the case against Bala Pasha could not be proved but that Former Premiers Vivana and Palluau told him there was no proof against Bala and that the case would have to be abandoned.

M. Cailleux appeared to be worn after his long ordeal, but less so than the venerable President of the Senate Leon Bourgeois, and some of the aged senators, who already are showing the strain the trial is imposing upon them. The galleries in the Senate again were crowded today with women some of them in low necked gowns, lending the appearance of a gala night at the opera.

CANADIAN OFFICER LOSES CASE.

LONDON, Feb. 22.—In the divorce court today, Lieut. Colonel Albert Newton Sturrett, Canadian army service corps was ordered to pay \$5,000 damages and the costs of the suit in which William Poole Lester Jones, formerly an Officer in the air force, was granted a case on account of the infidelity of his wife, Winifred Mary Elizabeth. The judge said that the case had one particularly discreditable feature this being that the correspondent was a Canadian officer in Great Britain, and knew that the woman with whom he set up a criminal intimacy was the wife of a British officer serving in France. The case was undefended.

RETURNS TO WIFE AFTER ABSENCE OF TWENTY-ONE YEARS

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—Twenty-one years ago Israel Galipeau left Hull to seek his fortune in the wilds of Michigan. A few months after he left, his wife learned that he had been dangerously injured and had subsequently died. During the last two decades she had been mourning his loss and was supporting herself by conducting a boarding house in Hull. But Galipeau, who had lost his memory for many years, is not dead, and has been reunited with his wife. It appears that he had received a blow on the head that blotted out his past, and it was not until he had been confronted with familiar faces that his memory returned.


