 The following from the St. John's Telegram will be of interest to Islanders who have visited Newfoundland and many of whom have stayed at the Crosbie Hotel. Robert Crosbie referred to, is well known in Charlottetown where he has often visited and is a brother of Mrs. T. B. Woodman, Alberton. In the midst of their slumbers last night the thirty guests at the Crosbie Hotel were awakened by the cry of "Fire!" All were soon crowding down stairs, some dressed and others partially so, and all enquiring what could be done or what aid could be given to stop the flames the seat of which as yet had not been discovered. Robert Crosbie on going to the furnace room on the ground floor, found it in flames. Mr. Bulman, who happened to have a dozen tubes of "Killyfyre" in his room, was soon on the spot and with the assistance of the other boarders quickly had them ready for use. The cause of the fire is supposed to have been the lighting of the joisting and inner ceiling between the furnace room and the hall, near which the smoke pipe from the furnace is placed. This pipe it is presumed, had become "clogged" with soot, which caught fire owing to the enormous heat which was on to keep the hotel warm till morning. The stained glass partition of the office was broken and tube after tube of "Killyfyre" passed to Mr. Crosbie, who heroically fought the flames in the stifling smoke of a place scarcely large enough for him, to turn round in. The "Killyfyre" kept down the flames, although it was almost impossible to reach them. In the meantime, J. L. Murphy of Trepassy, who is a guest at the hotel, went to the foot of Prescott Street and rang in an alarm. The Central and Eastern firemen were promptly on the scene. It was now found that the smoke was filling the top rooms, which told plainly that the fire was going up between the ceiling and the chimney. The walls of the first, second and fourth hallways were broken away, and the hose from the chemical tank up-stairs. The large hose from the hydrant was also played on the flames in the furnace room and soon had the desired effect. The fire must have started at 9 p. m., as about that time one of the guests locked in the furnace room and told the porter that it was full of smoke. The porter went there and said everything was all right, and that the furnace was only smoking. The first alarm was given the inmates shortly after midnight and it was 2 a. m. when they could feel safe in retiring again. Messrs. Bulman and R. Crosbie had plenty of scope to show their energy for fire fighting, and are to-day the lions of the hour. Mr. Bell says that had it not been for the persistent effort of the latter, the hotel would have burnt to the ground. The full extent of the damage is not yet known, but it will probably reach \$600. The hotel is two-thirds insured.
