Notes By The Way

Quite superior himself to any such base ambition, he compels us to infer that as he would have despised himself had he been looking toward the Bench he must have an equal lordly and virtuous contempt for any other lawyer now in politics who aspires to a Judgeship! What say the Honorable Attorney General, the Honorable Mr. Speaker and Mr. A. C. Saunders, M.L.A., in whose faces this implication was flung by their leader? We hardly think that the incident will quench their honorable aspirations toward the fourth judgeship, and it certainly need not. But which of them could have listened to this part of the Budget speech without feeling himself metaphorically slapped in the face?

Yes, there was undoubtedly a motive behind that portion of the Budget speech which had nothing to do with the Budget. The motive apparently included in its censure the present judges of the Supreme Court, each of whom has honorably passed through the Premiership to his present position. One passage clearly pointed to the late Chief Justice Sullivan of honored memory. He also had been Premier before he was made Chief Justice, and in order to make it clear that he was included the withdrawal of funds from our credit at Ottawa, which took place during his Premiership was dragged into the debate! Why did Premier Bell thus impute to dead and living judges and to all present and future aspirants for promotion the most despicable ideas and motives?

All are familiar with Aesop's fable of the Fox and the Grapes. The fox unable to reach the grapes declared them sour. Does anybody believe that Hon. John H. Bell would not gladly and instantly have accepted a Judgeship if he could have got it? Had he ever the slightest chance to obtain a Supreme Court or a County Court Judgeship under any government since he was called to the bar? Many judges have been appointed during that long period, but who ever heard his name mentioned in connection with a judicial vacancy? Sometimes we read of the office seeking the man. Well, if the Judicial Office ever sought the Honorable John H. Bell the fact seems not to be on record.

And now that increasing years have shut the gate of possibility to either appointment or aspiration, he discovers that the grapes are sour! Other Premiers have climbed the golden stair in procession, a goodly number, but he can never follow them upwards. Oh, the grapes are very sour in such a case as that! But he can stand below and in pompous vacuity and overweening vanity boast that he never wanted to be a Judge! And this in a Budget speech! What a speech and what a spectacle it was! Surely every court in the land may well be moved to laughter and every able and ambitious member of the Bar incited to derision. But after all it seems quite characteristic of the speaker, and fits in very well with the sing song.

STUYVESANT FISH DEAD; BIG NEW YORK FINANCIER
NEW YORK, April 15.—Stuyvesant Fish, director of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway and of the National Park Bank died suddenly here to-day.

Fish was 72 and was born in New York. He was the son of Hamilton Fish, secretary of state in the cabinet of President Grant. He started his career as railway clerk in the Illinois Central railroad office in 1871. Later he became director and extended his activities to other railways.

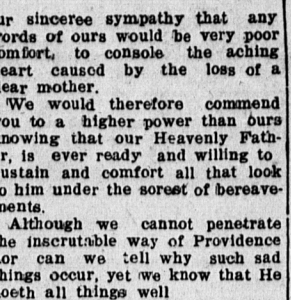
